
An Organ Concert

THE INSTRUMENT

The organ to be heard this afternoon was built and installed by the W. W. Kimball Company in 1906, and is one of the oldest surviving Kimball organs. It utilizes a "tubula:-pneumatic" action to control its eleven ranks of pipes. Its voicing is considered "Romantic" in that its sound is generally powerful and rich, but not as colorful or bright as organs of the "Neo-classical" voicing in vogue today. During the summer of 1985, the organ underwent restoration by the Bradford (formerly Prairie) Organ Company of Evanston, who also added a new rank of two foot pipes, contributing new versatility and brightness to its sound.

THE ORGANISTS

ROGER DAGGY, born in 1959 in Waynesboro, Virginia, began piano lessons at the age of seven. He began organ lessons at the age of thirteen studying with Robert Edward Zimmerman. Mr. Daggy received the degree of Bachelor of Music in 1982 from Northwestern University. He is currently completing a program towards the degree of Master of Church Music also from Northwestern. His organ professors at Northwestern are Dr. Richard Enright and Wolfgang Rubsam. He also served as assistant organist to Grigg Fountain at N.U.'s Alice Millar Chapel. Currently, Mr. Daggy is organist at Chicago's Lincoln Park Presbyterian Church and full time apprentice with the Bradford Organ Company of Evanston.

KEVIN MC KELVIE began his musical career at age twelve when he became organist at Calvary Church in his native Waterloo, Iowa. He holds a Bachelor of Music degree in organ performance and a Master of Music degree in conducting from Northwestern University in Evanston. At Northwestern, he studied organ with Grigg Fountain, conducting with John P. Paynter and served as graduate choral assistant to the Alice Millar Chapel Choir. From 1983-1985, McKelvie was Director of Instrumental Music at Alma College in Alma, Michigan where he conducted the Alma Symphony Orchestra, the college's three bands and taught orchestration, conducting and studio organ. Presently, he is Music Director and Conductor of the McHenry County Youth Orchestra, Organist/Choirmaster for St. Gregory's Episcopal Church, Deerfield, and an employee with the Bradford Organ Company in Evanston.
