

Calvary's organ is "one of the most unique instruments of its kind in America today and was especially designed for the liturgy of the Lutheran Church...

This is one of the first organs in this country to make use of a technique in tone production which was typical of certain notable organ builders of the past, an art which can be studied in several historic organs in Germany, Holland, Spain, and on our own continent in Mexico.

The construction and installation of this organ took seven months to complete. Its some 1600 pipes are constructed of tin, lead, zinc, and the pipes of the casework are made of 80% burnished tin. The finest woods have been used in its construction and include poplar, Honduras mahogany and oak. Over seven miles of wire connect the intricate mechanism of the chests and console.

The organ was built by Robert Noehren of international fame, who was the University Organist of the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Michigan. Mr. Noehren designed the case and console and was responsible for the tonal designs, voicing and finishing
