Console to be detached and located in area determined by the Church. Unless otherwise specified the exterior will be of Oak finished to match woodwork of the Sanctuary. Interiors such as key-frames, stop-jambs and music rack will be of polished walnut. Organ bench to be of same material as console. Console lights for music rack and pedal board. Stops will be draw-knobs and couplers tilting tablets.

Old blowerr to be used with new rectifier. Power wiring and wind conductors from blower to organ chamber to be installed by the Church.

Organ to be installed in one chamber. No case grill or display pipes included.

Necessary plans and measurements to be furnished the organ builders by the church.

It is understood that Mr. Fred Oliver, resident of the Casavant Organ Company, is giving the chimes in memory of his parents who were early members of Austin Avenue Methodist Church.

It is further understood that the blower from the old organ is to be used as it was undamaged in the fire. The static reservoir above the blower will also be used but it will be releathered by organ builder.

DETAILS OF CONSTRUCTION

All material used in the construction of this organ will be of the very best quality. All lumber used will be dry-kilned in the most modern and scientific manner in order to avoid as much as possible the effects of atmospheric changes, and finished with one coat of shellac and one coat of varnish.

The different parts of the organ will be disposed in such manner as to assure as far as possible free egress of tone, and easy access for regulating and tuning.

The blower will be of the centrifugal type, direct connected to an electric motor of standard construction, the unit to be entirely of metal, and designed to be of sufficient capacity to furnish a steady supply of wind to meet all reasonable demands.

The reservoirs will be of the single fold type with springs (or part weights if necessary) to assure an even pressure. They will be leathered throughout with the best grade of sheepskin, and placed near to their respective chests, and will be of a sufficient size to regulate an even and ample flow of wind to the chests. Concussions will also be placed wherever necessary to assure stability of pressure.

The wind chests will have an individual valve to each pipe, and the stop action to be of the "pitman" type. All pipe-valves will be easily accessible for adjustment or repairs.

The expression boxes to be of glued up stock (not panelled) and the shutters well adjusted, and felted to silence their action.

The console will be constructed with the greatest care. Unless otherwise specified, the exterior wood-work, the organist's bench, and the pedal-board frame will be of oak. The interior fittings around the key-board will be of highly polished black walnut. The pedal-board will be concave and radiating.

Our electro-magnets will be of the two pole horse-shoe type, and will be set in bakelite bases to assure a permanent state of regulation. The manual and pedal action will be of our own patented type, with contacts of Sterling silver. All parts of the mechanism will be designed so as to be easily accessible for regulation purposes. Where silence of operation is required all moving parts are well bushed with felt.

The Adjustable Combination mechanism will be of our own patented type which visibly affect the registers and couplers, and is adjustable at the console.

The metal pipes will be made from alloys of tin and lead in the appropriate proportions required tonally by each stop. The mouths and tuning pieces of all zinc pipes will be made from an alloy of tin and lead. Pipes of zinc will not extend farther up the compass of any stop than tenor F, i.e., approximately 3 feet in length.

The wood pipes will be of first quality pine, glue-sized inside, and coated with shellac and varnish to protect them against moisture. All pipe feet of less than 3/4" bore to have metal toes. All pipe feet larger than 3/4" bore to be fitted with special wind regulators.

All the pipes will be voiced with great care by voicers of long experience, and in such a manner that although each stop will have its own distinctive character, it will also be a tonal unit of a well-balanced ensemble.

The organ will be completely erected in our factory, and every portion will be carefully inspected for possible defects by men who are specialists in this line of work, before the instrument is shipped.

MEMO OF AGREEMENT

6.—The Purchaser agrees to provide the proper space and a level floor therein for the erection of said organ and have the said building in proper condition for the erection of the said organ that is to say, free from dust or undue dampness, at least 30 days previous to the date stipulated for the completion of the said organ.

7.—To keep at the Purchaser's expense the said building at such temperature as shall be required for erecting, regulating and tuning the said organ, and to supply free of charge the necessary light and power needed during all the installation of the said organ.

8.—To provide the required air-tight galvanized iron piping to convey the wind from the blower to the organ and a suitable room or enclosure for the blowing apparatus, constructed in accordance with directions furnished by the Seller.

9.—To furnish and install all wiring, switches and starter pertaining to the blowing apparatus; to furnish and install iron conduits for organ cables and wires if demanded by local conditions; to install such electric lights as may be needed for the erection and future care of the said organ, and to do all cutting of floors, partitions or other parts of the building that may be necessary for the erection of said organ.

11.—To provide if necessary a convenient place reasonably easy of access in which to store the organ materials after they have been unloaded from the cars, pending their being assembled in the organ chamber or gallery.

12.—To assume all responsability for said organ and parts thereof, covering loss, or damage by fire, lightning, explosion, water, tornado, rodents, or any other cause beyond the control of the Seller, while contained in the said building or storage as provided by clause 11 of this agreement insuring the same in good reliable companies and, if required, to deliver to the Seller such insurance policies to protect both parties hereto as their interests may appear and be established.

13.—To furnish if required, certified plans of the chamber or gallery in which said organ is to be erected, also exact information regarding the nature of the electric current available at said building for the operation of the blowing apparatus.

14.—The delivery of said organ as stipulated in the present agreement is subject to all details of the specifications hereto annexed being decided upon, and certified plans referred to in preceding clause being furnished to the Seller at least six months before the date fixed for the shipment of said organ. Failing this, the final delivery of said organ shall be delayed in the same proportion as the delay in furnishing certified plans and deciding on all details of specifications as aforesaid. In the event of any charge in the dimensions or conditions being made to the chamber or gallery after the said certified plans have been furnished to the Seller, and after the construction of said organ has begun, any extra work to organ as may be involved shall be at the expenses of the Purchaser.

15.—There are no verbal or other agreements or representations except as contained in this agreement, and the specifications and details of constructions hereto annexed, and no change or modification made verbally will be binding upon the Seller unless the same be made in writing, and signed by an executive officer of the Seller.

16.—When said organ is ready for shipment and is held up by the inability for any reason of the Purchaser to receive the shipment and have the installation proceed, 80% of the total purchase price shall immediately become due, or interest shall begin from that date on the amounts due. However, if the purchaser by writing advises the Seller in due time of any delay in the construction of the building, the Seller does agree to delay the building of the organ as long as market condition will allow it.

17.—Upon complete installation of the said organ the Purchaser, with and in the presence of the representative of the Seller, shall examine the same, and if found to be fully completed in accordance with this contract will then give acceptance of the same. Final settlement shall not be withheld on account of minor matters of tuning and ordinary care after completion of said organ, which are not covered by our guarantee.

18.—It is mutually agreed that said organ is to be and remain personal property, and the title to and ownership thereof shall continue to remain in the Seller until such time as the contract price or notes shall be fully paid in cash, and that in the event of the Purchaser failing to comply with the terms of this contract or any one of them, all sums herein paid to the Seller shall at its election be considered, treated and retained by the Seller as liquidated damages for the breach thereof, and the Seller shall have the right to remove and take to itself said organ or portion thereof wheresoever the same may be.

Robert "Pop" Hopkins was born July 7, 1897, in South Wales and was the son of Robert Hopkins and Sarah Lewis Hopkins.

As a child, he enjoyed singing as recreation after working with his father and brothers in the coal mines of Wales. As a young man, he sang to entertain the troops in Europe during World War I. In 1921 he won the Gold Medal at the National Eisteddfod of Wales. He left Wales to tour Europe and the United States for five years with the Rhondda Welsh Male Chorus where he served as business manager and baritone soloist. When the chorus performed in Waco in 1926, Dr. S.P. Brooks, the president of Baylor University, heard him perform and asked him to serve on the faculty of the School of Music. At Baylor University, Professor Hopkins organized the A Cappella Choir in 1934 and served for 29 years as the choir director at Austin Avenue Church until his death on April 25, 1957.

Professor Hopkins and his wife, Sarah A. Jones, had three sons, Gwynfryn, Aeron, and Robert David, and one daughter, Sarah Hopkins Moore.

Ethel Gladys McGregor Smith was born on June 24, 1892, in Michigan and was the daughter of Jud B. McGregor and Allie Dye McGregor. She married Fred W. Smith and later attended Baylor University where she studied organ. Joining Austin Avenue Methodist Church on June 3, 1917, Mrs. Smith held the position of organist at Austin Avenue Church from 1919 until her death on May 3, 1962. For many years she also served as organist for Connally Funeral Home of Waco.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith had one son, Fred W. Smith, Jr.

and in honor of organist Nancy Henson . . .

Nancy Tripp Henson was born on May 29, 1929, in St. Joseph, Missouri and is the daughter of Dr. Edgar Franklin Tripp and Elvira Whitaker Tripp. In 1938 her family moved to Montgomery, Alabama where she later graduated from Lanier High School. She attended Oberlin Conservatory of Music and later Baylor University, where she studied organ with Dr. Robert Markham. In 1950 she received her B.M. degree in organ from Baylor University.

She has held the position of organist at First Baptist Church of Waco and Seventh & James Baptist Church, and interim organist at Central Christian Church, Lake Shore Baptist Church, and Columbus Avenue Baptist Church. In 1969 she assumed the position of organist at Austin Avenue Church. In 1989 the congregation added a zimbelstern to the organ in her honor for her 20th anniversary as Austin Avenue's organist.

In 1952 she married Jack Henson, Jr., and they have two sons, Jack and Jeff, and five grandchildren.

Frederick Grimes is a graduate of Baylor University where he studied organ with Dr. Robert Markham. In Waco, he served as the organist and choirmaster at Austin Avenue Methodist Church, Saint Alban's Episcopal Church, and Temple Rodef Sholom. He moved to New York City in 1967 to be Associate Organist at Saint Thomas Church and to serve on the organ faculty at the Manhattan School of Music.

Mr. Grimes has studied organ with Everett Jay Hilty at the University of Colorado, Paul Lindsley Thomas of Dallas, and Dr. Michael Schneider at the Hochschule für Musik in Berlin, Germany. As an organ recitalist, conductor, and workshop leader, he has been the featured organist of the Spoleto Festival in Charleston, South Carolina, and has played recitals at the Cathedral Church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul, Washington, D.C.; the Cadet Chapel, West Point; The Riverside Church; Trinity Church, Wall Street; Saint Thomas Church; and Saint Patrick's Cathedral in New York City.

In 1992, Mr. Grimes returned to his native Texas where he served as organist and choirmaster at the Episcopal Church of the Good Shepherd, Cedar Hill, and taught a course in sacred music for the Anglican School of Theology in Dallas. He currently serves as choirmaster and organist at All Saints' Episcopal Church in Fort Worth, Texas.
