## AUSTIN ORGANS, INC. organ architects and builders

Austin Organs, Inc. is now nearing its centennial year. It was chosen to build Opus 2734 for Westminster because of the company's long history of innovative, reliable artistic achievements in the world of organ creation.

Some of Austin's especially notable installations have been: The Mormon Tabernacle, Salt Lake City; St. Matthew's Lutheran, Hanover, PA; Church of the Heavenly Rest, New York City; St. Joseph Cathedral, Hartford, CT; Fifth Avenue Presbyterian, New York City; The Brick Presbyterian Church, New York City; First Presbyterian Church, New York City; Trinity College, Hartford, CT; Holy Family Cathedral, Tulsa, OK; Marble Collegiate Church, New York City; Ursinus College, Collegeville, PA; St. Vibiana Cathedral, Los Angeles, CA.

Westminster's organ has taken two years to design and build. After detailed specifications were established, the painstaking process of handmaking each pipe and component took place.

During construction, sections of the total organ are assembled and tested many ways at Austin Organs. After careful scientific adjustments are made, the many organ segments are disassembled into manageable sections and shipped to the church for final assembly.


Once the organ is playable at the church, experts from the factory's voicing department carefully adjust the pipes to match placement and acoustics in the building. This takes several weeks of work in surroundings with absolute quiet.

The Austin Organs logo carries in Latin the phrase: "Scientia artum adjuvat," i.e., Science aids Art. Pipe organ building is the convergence of many arts and disciplines: woodworking, metalworking, and an infinite variety of tonal and design concepts. Thus, science aids art. The pipe organ has long been the instrument of the Church because of its ability to touch people at the deepest levels of emotion whether it be a simple prayer or a mighty anthem of praise. Soli Deo Gloria!






The Great Division
—Chancel South




Nave Organ
