Henry Eerger's factory a very fine organ, of which the following are the particulars: The case is of solid car, in the Gothic style of architecture, measuring 18 feet in height, it feet wide and 9 feet drap. It contains two rows of keys and 18 stops, amongst which are open dispason, pedal, hauthoy, dulciana and a variety of other reed stops. The case is a handsome piece of work, the front being acountd with elaborate carving, and the instrument pleases the congregation. It has been performed on by professors from Philadelphia and Baltimore, who speak of it in the highest terms. It has been erected in an archway on the side of the pulpit, there being no organ gallery in the church.
