

An Organ for New Jerusalem Church.

The appeal made last week to the congregation of the New Jerusalem Church, Calvert street, near Chase street, for subscriptions to the fund being raised to put a pipe organ in the church, has resulted in raising the desired amount, and the organ will be put in this week. The workmen have already begun the task of erecting the new instrument in the alcove or "chapel" at the left of the chancel. A large part of the fund was contributed by the Young People's League. The instrument was made by Henry Niemann, of Baltimore, and has a good tone, well adapted to the size of the church. The specification of stops is as follows: Pedal—Bourdon, 16 feet, and violon, 8 feet. Manual stops—diapason, 8 feet; gamba, 8 feet; gemahorn, 8 feet; stopped diapason, 8 feet; flute, 4 feet; principal, 4 feet; twelfth, $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet; fifteenth, 2 feet; cornet, three ranks. It has a full pedal scale and the usual mechanical stops, and is worked by an automatic motor. It is encased in a handsome walnut frame and has richly-ornamented pipes, and conforms in design to the architecture of the church. Mr. Harry G. Martin is organist.
