# —THE ORGANIST—



Ken Cowan is one of the most sought-after organists in North America. He has performed solo recitals across the United States and Canada and has won numerous awards, including first prizes at the Royal Canadian College of Organists National Competition and the Yale Institute of Sacred Music National Competition. Currently Mr. Cowan serves as Adjunct Assistant Professor of Organ at Westminster Choir College in Princeton, NJ, and is the Associate Organist and Artist in Residence at Saint Bartholomew's Church, New York City.

A native of Thorold, Ontario, Canada, Mr. Cowan received the Master's degree and Artist Diploma from the Yale Institute of Sacred Music, studying organ with Thomas Murray. Prior to attending Yale, he graduated with a Bachelor of Music degree from the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia where he studied


with John Weaver. As a boy, Mr. Cowan received his first organ lessons from his father, organist David Cowan. Then during his high school years he studied with James Bigham in Buffalo, NY. Previous positions included Assistant Organist posts at St. James Episcopal Church, the Church of Saint Mary the Virgin, and Saint Clement's Church in Philadelphia. He has also been on the roster of Associate Organists for the famous Wanamaker Grand Court organ in Philadelphia.

In 2004 Mr. Cowan was a featured artist at the national convention of the American Guild of Organists held in Los Angeles, California. He has also performed at many regional conventions of the AGO and has been a featured artist at several conventions of the Organ Historical Society and the Royal Canadian College of Organists.

Numerous critically acclaimed compact disc recordings are available by Mr. Cowan, most of them on the JAV label. His most recent release is The Art of the Symphonic Organist, which was recorded on the 1921 E. M. Skinner organ at the Parish of St. Luke in Evanston, IL. Mr. Cowan also joined organist Justin Bischof in the world premiere recording of American composer Aaron Miller's *Double Concerto* for organ, recorded with the Zurich Symphony Orchestra on the Kleuker organ in the Tonhalle, Zurich, Switzerland (Ethereal Recordings). Many of Mr. Cowan's recordings and live performances are regularly featured on the nationally distributed radio show PIPEDREAMS from American Public Media.

### —THE ORGAN BUILDER—

Our association with Rutgers Presbyterian Church began in the fall of 2002, when we were asked to survey the existing M. P. Möller instrument. Opus 4276 was completed for the new Rutgers Church in 1926. Möller also constructed a small instrument for the chapel, now the Daniel Russell Room, which is no longer in existence. Interestingly, twelve stops and the façade from the Frank Roosevelt Organ, Opus 436, which was installed in the Rutgers Riverside Church on Broadway in 1890, were included in the new Möller Organ. In 1962, Möller built a new four manual console to replace the original, and later the company installed a new blower. Otherwise, what existed was the original work from 1926. Our survey concluded that very serious deterioration was taking place in the organ to the extent that it would cease to function in the near future. On a more positive note, some of the voices which were still playable, especially the Roosevelt pipework, convinced us that there were resources in the instrument which needed to be



preserved. Early in 2003, George Davey, Organist and Choral Director of the church, and I collaborated on the new tonal specification for our proposal. We agreed on a 68 rank instrument, later to become 70, which would be extremely eclectic in nature to accommodate all types and periods of music. In July 2003, a contract was signed between Southfield Organ Builders and Rutgers Church.

In order to accommodate the increased size of the instrument and the poor condition of the original components, we constructed new electropneumatic slider chests and unit chests. We retained and rebuilt four of the original Möller unit chests and the swell shades, operated by new shade engines. We rebuilt and revoiced any of the existing pipework that we reused. We were able to preserve eleven of the twelve Roosevelt stops in the new organ. Many of the higher pitched stops are new, built to our specifications and voiced in our shop. Of the fourteen reed voices, six are new and eight are original ranks that were revoiced. The console components are all new with the exception of the outer case, which was redesigned

and refinished. One of the greatest challenges of the project was to keep the organ playable during nearly all of the new construction. This was accomplished by doing the work in two separate phases. The first nine months saw the Great, Choir, and part of the Pedal Divisions completed for Easter 2004. In the second phase, the console, Swell, the remainder of the Pedal Division, and the Antiphonal Division were completed by Easter 2005. The most dramatic visual changes to the

room occurred with the installation of the exposed pipework of the Marshall Williamson Antiphonal Division and the new Rutgers Quartet Trompette en Chamade on the rear gallery wall.

I would like to acknowledge the other members of the Southfield team whose talents and dedication to the project contributed so much to its success. They are: Marc S. Winer, Linda M. Carbone, Zachary T. Rohlfs, George A. Choban, and Alex R. Belair.



I could not end this history of our time at Rutgers Presbyterian Church without mentioning a few names of those who contributed to this endeavor. Firstly, I want to thank the Reverend Dr. Byron Shafer, Pastor of Rutgers Church, for his leadership, support, and confidence in us. George Davey, Organist and Choral Director, gave us a greater sense of the musical needs and aspirations of the Church, and Bruce Bergquist, Executive Director of Property and Administration, worked with us to coordinate the project, especially while we were on site. Lastly, to the members and friends of Rutgers Church, thank you for the foresight and means to make this organ possible. May it bring you much joy and happiness in the years to come.
