The Organ.

The organ was built by the Miller Organ Company of Lebanon, and is a masterpiece of art both in the construction, finish and tone. It is a piece of musical perfection in the line of organ building. The case is of oak and finished in harmony with the other furniture of the church. It has upwards of 1,000 pipes, 2 manuals and 54 stops and 2 composition pedals. It has two fronts one of which shows in the chancel and one in transept of church. The action is bushed throughout with felt and the interior finished with two coats of shellac and one coat of oil. The exterior has a dead wood finish. The front at the chancel is composed of the bass of Open Diapason and Dulciana with all the pipes richly decorated. The transept shows pedal Violoncella and will also be elaborately decorated. This front contains a door through which the choir processional can enter the body of the church if desirable. The great organ contains the following stops: Trumpet, 15, 12; flute d'Armour; Octave, Dulciana, Melodia, Open Diapason, Coupio to Pedal, Swell to Pedal, Pedal Check and Bellows Signal. The swell organ contains the following stops: Flute Traversa, Flautina, Oboe, Bassoon, Bass, Tremolo, Open Diapason, Salicional, Stop Diapason, Bass, Lieb-Gedarkt. The Reed organ contains a Bourdon and Violoncella. The organ is unlike almost any other which the firm has built. It is of reverse action, showing fronts in two separate and distinct parts of the church. The work certainly reflects credit on the skill of the builders.

Notes.

The organ will not be finished until Saturday. The organ was used this morning however, only five stops remaining unfinished.

Robert Coleman, Esq., the well-known iron king, subscribed \$500 towards the church.

Mr. Henry H. Houston, one of our old citizens and who has a \$10,000 interest in the church, was at the dedication.

The citizens of town, outside of the church, so far subscribed \$500 towards the new edifice.

H. M. North, Esq., and wife, will in the near future place a memorial window in the chancel in memory of the parents of Mrs. North, Hon. Thos. E. Franklin and wife.

Miss Mary E. Gordon will place a memorial "Rose window" in the east wall to the memory of her parents, William Gordon and wife. One will be placed in the transept by Col. Samuel Shoch. The many friends of Rev. David E. Wilson, who was once a member of this church, have placed one to his memory. In the front on either side are two handsome windows, one presented by J. B. Mellinger and the other in memory of John Webster Williams.
