Bobby Hendley is a native of East Texas who has lived in several East Texas cities. He was born in Corsicana, Texas, and graduated from high school in Athens, Texas.

It was in high school that Mr. Hendley was introduced to the pipe organ by his high school choir director, Mamie Downing, who was also organist/choirmaster at the First Presbyterian Church in Athens. It was with Mrs. Downing's motivation and training that Mr. Hendley competed and won honors as a chorister at the state and national levels, touring Europe in 1980 as a member of the America's Youth In Concert choir. During this time, he also received a considerable amount of informal training on the organ from Mrs. Downing.

As a student at East Texas Baptist University in Marshall, Texas, Mr. Hendley has studied Organ with Dr. Glenda Collins. Under Dr. Collins' tutelage, Mr. Hendley has appeared in several recitals this year. In May of 1985, he graduated with a Bachelor of Music degree in the field of Sacred Music.

Mr. Hendley has served as organist for several churches in the East Texas area and is currently the organist of First Baptist Church in Kilgore, Texas.

Prelude and Fugue in E Major

Vincent Lubeck

The initial toccata is striking for its brilliant opening material. The 16th-note theme descends from treble to bass where it joins an important pedal solo. The first fugue, for four voices, is followed by a brief interlude for manuals alone, a three-voice fugato in agile 16th-notes. The second fugue, also in four voices, transforms its subject into a rapid Allegro in ¾ time, while incorporating a counter-subject which is present until the grand concluding gesture of three slow and stately measures.

Wenn wir in hochsten Nothen sein Johann Sebastian Bach ("When We Are Found In Greatest Need")

Bach knew chorales intimately and was constantly using them as a basis for new works. In the Orgelbuchlein, Bach gave this chorale a coloratura (or highly embellished) setting. Such ornamentation became one of Bach's greatest trademarks.

Wachet Auf

Iohann Sebastian Bach

One of the six Schubler Chorales, Wachet Auf is a transcription of the tenor solo in Bach's Cantata 140. The setting is a trio arrangement calling for the melody to stand out distinctly from the two other parts.

Concerto in a minor BWV 593

This concerto is originally scored by Vivaldi for two violins and string orchestra. Written in the Allegro-Adagio-Allegro format, it remains basically intact as Vivaldi composed it. Bach's organ transcription, however, does bear his unmistakable marks.

Chorale No. 1 (in E Major)

Cesar Franck

One of only three chorales composed by Franck, the E Major Chorale opens with a stately harmonized melody. Franck develops the melody according to the *cellule generatrice* technique, in which the entire piece grows from the same motivic material. The chorale ends with a dramatic statement of the theme in block chords and solo pedal.

Two Intermezzi

Hermann Schroeder

Tonal variety within traditional forms make these works interesting. Schroeder is a contemporary German composer who is well known in America.

While in Ohio, Mr. Nelson served as Assistant Organist/Choirmaster of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Akron, where he worked and studied with the traditional choir of men and boys, and later, he became Organist/Choirmaster of Trinity Lutheran Church.

was a Tenor Lay Clerk in the choir of men and boys of Norwich Cathedral, Norwich, England, where he continued study in the traditional English cathedral musical style. From 1980 to 1981, he returned to the United States to become a pipe voicer and installer for the Reuter Pipe Organ Company of Lawrence, Kansas, and Assistant Organist/ Choirmaster of Grace Cathedral, Topeka.






