We wrote you on April 4th to come and take the organ out which you claim belongs to you. A few days later I hurt my knee and was operated on and have been in the hospital for the past eight weeks. During that time your representatives called and had the privelege of removing anything they wanted in the organ. They removed the console and other equipment which they wanted and left us with a few of the other parts of the organ.

I feel that it is no more than right from your concern to send us a release releasing us from any obligations that may come up in the near future, or if you have any records filed I would appreciate your removing them as I was willing to give it up to you at a moment's notice. If you feel that you want any other parts you can come and get it out but do not destory any installations that take care of our refrigeration as we have ducts running through these chambers and they are very delicate.

We are planning on sending our installation men there the latter part of next week to remove the instrument. I will advise you within the next few days as to the exact date the men will arrive in Pittsburgh.

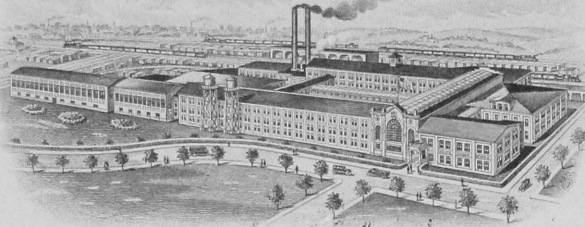

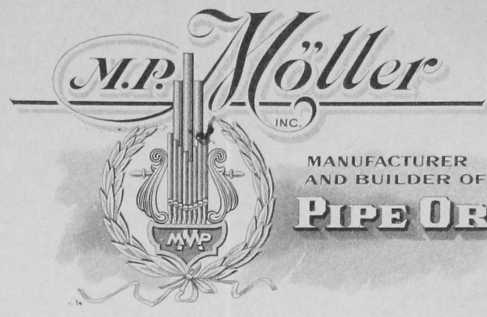

We have been advised that you are the owner of the Roosevelt Theatre in which several years ago we installed a pipe organ under a contract with the owners. Installation of the organ was made but for some reason it was impossible to secure a settlement and payment on the organ, which was possibly due to the advent of sound pictures just at that time. For some time we have been endeavoring to find out just what the status of the matter is and we have been advised that you are now the owner of the property, and we therefore write to you to make arrangements to remove the organ parts, which under our agreement with the owners of the property at the time of the installation, have continued to remain our property subject to their having been paid for by the theatre company.

We ask you to please advise us when it would be convenient to you for our men to come to the theatre at Pittsburgh and remove the organ parts.

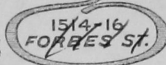

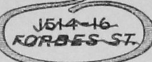

Referring to your letter of February 2nd and the organ in the Roosevelt Theatre. I think I asked you when I saw you last to find out whether they would be willing to let us remove that organ without legal procedure. If so, the thing to do is to take it out and ship it here, and then try to resell it any way we can, but I am wondering whether, under the circumstances, replevin proceedings should be put through, and whether the contract has been kept recorded up to date, a matter which I can't find out now, as there seems to have been considerable neglect in that particular job and action should have been taken years ago.

Find out, under the circumstances, whether they would let us remove the organ without interference, and if so, that is the easiest way to settle it; then if we can sell it again, we'll sell it.

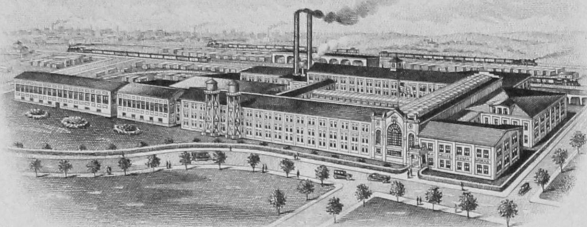

This matter came up a number of times during the summer and fall of 1929. I talked to the purchaser and you had correspondence with them. At your request I consulted our attorney here who made some investigation and advised that we take immediate legal steps to collect what was then due and to collect each payment as it was defaulted. There was considerable correspondence about it but you decided against the suggestion and elected to wait until the whole lease account was due before you retained any attorney.

In looking at the correspondence between us at the time the organ was installed I see that you anticipated litigation, and of course I do not know what may have transpired within that Jewish corporation in the last three years so I would suggest that you write them such a letter as would be apt to secure an answer that might indicate their present attitude and so suggest to you a way to get too them.

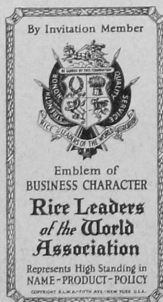
If you would prefer it I can see them but I am sure you should try to get something in writing beforehand, and if they do not answer within a week or so it would be well to see them.

Gentlemen,-

After a conference with your Mr Peloubet regarding the status of your organ, in the Roosevelt Theatre, I regret to say that at this moment it is utterly impossible to state a definite time wherein payments on your organ can be started. We are simply in a position that requires patience until such time as BANKERS are ready to make the loan to which they are committed.

We have been given every assurance that immediately after the first of the year conditions would be such that our money would be forthcoming. No doubt you understand a situation that is handled in banking circles insofar as a mortgage loan is concerned, and you can thus realize that were we forced to put them under too much pressure, at a time when they ask us to be a little patient with them, unfavorable and unfriendly results might obtain.

During the course of my conversation with Mr. Peloubet he asked me whether or not we were not willing to pay a bonus for the loan of this money and for that reason we were being held up. That is not a fact however, and to prove that contention and to prove that we are willing to pay a bonus for money, if Mr. Moller personally would be interested in a mortgage loan with substantial security, we would be pleased to negotiate with him provided however that immediate action would be obtained, if the necessary conditions were favorable to him.

I hope that you will not construe my letters as an evasion of payment, on the contrary as our record of over ten years as successful theatre operators will prove that we were never in a position wherein we asked co-operation of this nature. We were forced to meet a general financial condition that this country has not faced since the panic of 1907. But we have been slowly but surely pulling through to the top. As I explained to Mr Peloubet that within a very short time we will have our Western Electric paid out, and with that money our equipment obligations could be taken care of in great shape. Our proposition is an open book, we have nothing to hide or be ashamed of, for in spite of the unusually bad breaks that we have been forced to contend with through no fault of our own I again say that we will be out on top. Immediately that our mortgage money becomes available satisfactory payments will be started with your company.

Thanking you for your wonderful co-operation in the past, and rest assured that our obligation to you has not been forgotten-

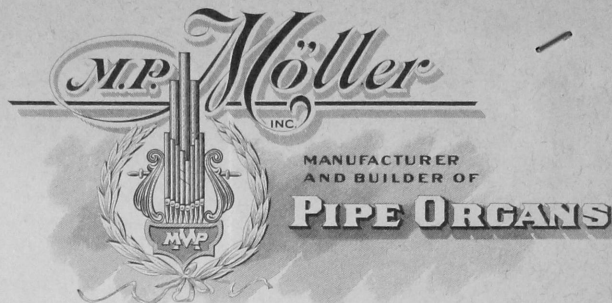

Since receiving your inquiry about settlement for the Roosevelt Theatre organ I have looked into the matter again and find that it may be practical to sue for the rent now due and then sue each month as rent may become in arrears.

If you decide to do this you will need to furnish a bill showing the monthly items and the interest that I understand accrues on overdue rent. There is considerable other correspondence that should be in our attorneys hands.

I also saw Mr. Hendle and he promised to write you again. I do not think he feels at all like paying. He had such a short use of the instrument before the talkies put it out of use that he is sorry he bought it. This is, of course, not your worry and I believe you should take some positive steps to get what is now due.

I am anxious to visit you for several reasons and if I do I will bring all my file on this matter and we may decide on exactly what you want and how to proceed to get it.

The reason you have not heard from me before this time has been due to the fact that we had not concluded our financial arrangements for the Roosevelt Theatre. I do not believe that this will surprise you inasmuch as you are thoroughly familiar with the money market at the present time, and we of course have been very unfortunate in that we are financing in the midst of the most chaotic money market in recent years. However I am very happy to report that we are making progress but it surely has been a slow process.

We have bonified commitments for our secondary financing but due to the unusual money conditions that confront the Banking Interests temporary delays have been made necessary. We are looking forward to conclude these arrangements from day to day. We have been forced to meet unusual conditions in this cycle of Talkies--but despite these obstacles the Roosevelt Theatre will develop into a money making theatre.

We must ask that you be patient with us for a further period, and immediately upon the conclusion of our mortgage financing definite remittances will be forwarded you. Thanking you for your consideration of the above and trusting that you are assured of the fact that we are working hard to justify the faith that you have in us.

Gentlemen:

After a conference with Mr. Peloubet relative to the Moller Organ which is installed in the Roosevelt Theatre, permit me to say that I have perhaps erred for not keeping in touch with you but as I explained to Mr. Peloubet conditions were such that in as much as I could not make a payment that explanations would not be of any immediate financial assistance to you.

No doubt you are aware of the conditions existing in the industry today--THE GULLIBLE SOUND-CRAZY PUBLIC--THE SOUND-CRAZY PRODUCERS--THE HIGH HANDED METHODS OF THE SOUND EQUIPMENT COMPANIES--AND THE UNFAIR ATTITUDE OF THE UNION TRADES--makes a very interesting and complex condition, however to unexpectedly meet the above situation has been no simple task but we are thankful that conditions are regaining a semblance of normalcy again.

The financial market with its revolutionary trend added materially to our difficulties despite the fact that we have a good theatre proposition in the Roosevelt. We have succeeded in placing a first mortgage on the Roosevelt which made it possible to take care of a substantial portion of the construction cost and now a second mortgage is in process of final negotiations which will put us in position to take care of our equipment.

We have been successful theatre operators for the past 10 years but this year we have found ourselves passing through a crisis that we have never encountered before. The companies from which equipment has been bought for our theatres have been very encouraging to us and we feel that in as much as we have never done any previous business with your company that you have been very generous in acknowledging your confidence in us.



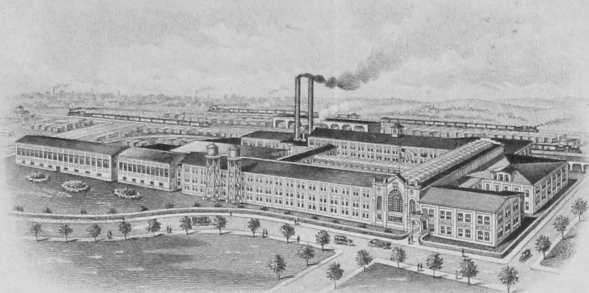

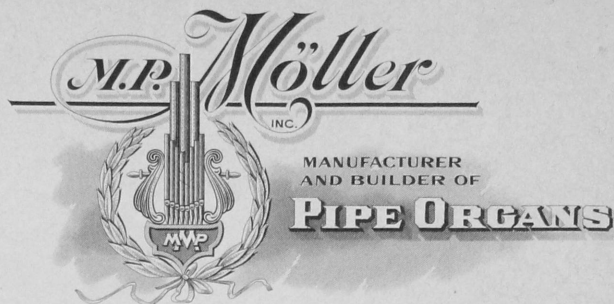

with the payments for the equipment.

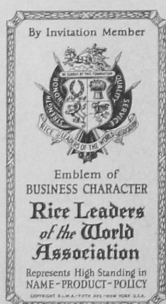

Dear Sir:

Our Mr. Peloubet called up today and stated that you had put men to unpacking the organ on your own responsibility, but had refused to sign the agreement per telephone message, that the total cost for this installation in a first class manner, subject to the conditions of the Lease entered into between us, at a price of seven hundred dollars.

I do not know how to interpret your refusal to enter this agreement, and at the same time your taking possession of our property for the purpose of installation, which in itself makes you liable for the guarantee, paragraph second; also that this work must be done within the price mentioned.

I was a little surprised about your bringing up the condition that the organ must be installed by Union Labor. This is not a Union factory, and no builders of first class organs are run as Union shops, and our organs are subject to installation by us unless otherwise specified in the contract, which was not in this case.

Your action will further render void the special paragraph regarding the trial period, since we cannot assume responsibility for an installation made in this manner by men of whom we know nothing and over whom we have no control.

If you will refer to paragraph, first page, entitled "B", you will see that it plainly stated that you will protect the builder or employees from any molestation or interruption while engaged in the installation of the organ, and that obligation on your part is absolutely binding upon you.

You probably have anticipated the responsibility involved in authorizing anyone to open the packages in which the organ was shipped, but am writing you calling attention to this as a matter of record and as your responsibility in the matter, as we had our own men there prepared to make the installation in exact accordance with the contract, and it was your obligation that they be permitted to do this without interruption or molestation, as has been done for us by all other theatres in which we have installed organs.

Mr. Luberoff has gotten a lot of fine letters, but so far haven't been able to get copies, although I expect to have them shortly, if I can get him to have them copied, but when you have any demonstrations, for the time being, shoot them to Phila., and they will take care of them over there in good shape, and then the Roosevelt organ is in, I don't think, unless for a very large one, you need to go anywhere to demonstrate. I understand that the complete specification of the Roosevelt organ was mailed you several days ago, but will look it up, but if I find it didn't go out, will inclose a copy herewith.

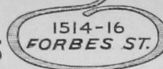

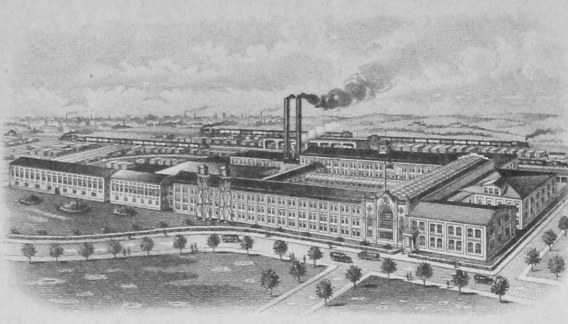

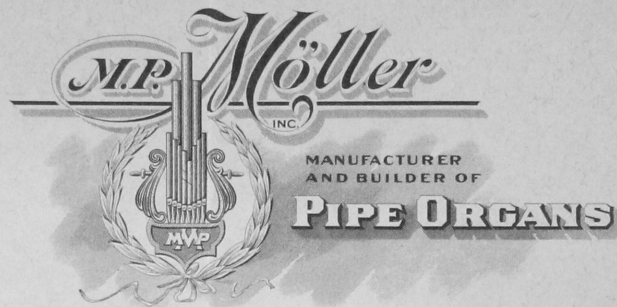

Please find enclosed a print showing the organ chambers in the Roosevelt Theatre here.

You will note that I have arranged for additional height, now 17'. and also that the floor of the chambers is on two elevations. I think it is plainly marked. The two chambers are alike.

The current for the blower will be 3 Phase 220 Volts, 60 Cycles.

The opening is 8' 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 7'6". but there is a perforated panel the width of the opening and 4' 6" high above the opening, giving you practically 12' in height for your expression. This I have also tried to show on the print.

The blow pipes can best be installed along the wall between the chambers and the stage, but please indicate where you prefer them.

We are sending, under separate cover, blue print showing detailed layout of organ for the Roosevelt Theatre, Pittsburg, and also showing console layout.

In regards to the detailed layout, we of course want you to have all measurements shown, accurately verified. You will note that the relay will be too large to take through the door into the organ chamber, and therefore will probably have to go through the shade opening, so whatever the theatre people are going to put up to conceal the shade opening, whatever sort of decorating feature, it will have to be removable if put up before the organ arrives, or must be left out until the relay has been taken into the chamber.

You note on the blue print the memorandum about the wood framework for the case to be installed by the theatre, and these must have a 4" length in the center.

Please give us the size of the auditorium and the approximate dimensions of it. The console will be 3'9" wide, and the door to the theatre wide enough to get the console into position.

As to whether the console layout must be approved by the theatre party will be left up to you. Your approval will be sufficient, and satisfactory as to your purchaser, if it is satisfactory to you, please give us your approval and then we will make it up.

Of course the colors of stop controls and carvings will be our standard theatre type. Please get this back here as soon as possible.
