The History of the Organs Installed in the

First Presbyterian Church, Davenport, Iowa 1873 - 1998

The music of First Presbyterian Church has a rich history, and from the beginning the organ has played a very significant role. Ministry through music has consistently been a top priority for this congregation -- in quality, quantity and budgeted resources.

The earliest records indicate that a hand-pumped Hook & Hastings pipe organ was purchased in 1873 for the Seventh Street Church. In 1896, The Rev. Dr. Little stated in his New Year Sermon: "For years we have had by far the best choir this city has ever known. It was so good it came near making the whole congregation good singers. It stimulated other choirs to excellence. And it leaves a faultless echo in the present arrangement." The widening vision of the First Church was reflected in the frequency with which out-of-town choirs provided musical programs, one of them being the Princeton College Glee Club during Christmas vacation 1894.

The 1873 organ was moved to the present building and rebuilt by the Moline Organ Company, at a cost of \$5,000, for its opening in December of 1899. The keyboards (console) and organ pipes occupied the area where the choir presently is seated. This organ had to be pumped by hand, and the organist had to depend on either the services of men or of boys employed by the church. William Cochrane said: "Oh yes, I pumped the organ--have vivid recollections of the speed with which the indicator shot up during the fortissimo passages, and how my arms ached--and my bellows near the bursting point. Have had a leaning towards soft pedaling ever since." History records that sometimes, when the organist stepped on the pedal, there was no response from the blower because the boy was asleep or visiting with some friend in a nearby carriage!

A newspaper article describing the first service in the Sanctuary, dated December 18, 1899 states: "At the organ, the sweet-toned old instrument from the old church, remodeled into conformity with the latest effects, Professor S.T. Bowlby presided most ably." It also noted that the choir "never sang with better spirit or effect." For the service of dedication, a subtitle for the newspaper headline read "Elaborate Program of the Day in Which Music is a Special Feature."

In April, 1915, Harry A. Whaley became the first full-time assistant in ministry to direct the church music and the work of the young people. Mr. Whaley soon trained a volunteer chorus which sang on occasions other than morning worship, when the paid quartet choir sang in vestments. In the budget for the year 1917, \$1,489 was allocated for the choir, music and organ boys. This represented over 10% of the church's \$14,431 annual budget. In 1919 it was decided to install an electrical motor for the organ bellows, and no longer did the organist have to depend on wandering boys to handpump the bellows!

In 1924 the sanctuary underwent a major renovation, creating a Byzantine decor throughout. Newspaper accounts at the time, stated: "One of the most needed improvements at the First Presbyterian Church was a new pipe organ to replace the instrument that had been in use for so many years and was obsolete on account of the mechanical action." (It is interesting to note that mechanical action organs have regained great favor in the present day.) "In the new instrument, made by the Bennett Organ company in Moline, the action is entirely electrical. A great improvement has been made over the usual church practice of placing the console or keyboard in such a way that the organist must follow the director by means of a

mirror. At the Presbyterian Church, the console is located in a pit on the main floor." This unique placement remains to the present day.

The 1924 instrument had 2,579 pipes, three keyboards and pedal. It was the largest church organ in the Tri-Cities. A new arrangement of pipes was created thru the use of rooms on either side of the chancel. The space formerly occupied by organ pipes now comprised the chancel on either side of which the choir members were seated facing each other. Overhead, a grill was placed "thru which the organ and vocal music blend before being carried to the auditorium." (Here, it is interesting to note that this idea would be the opposite of what acoustical engineers would now recommend.)

Records of the organ indicate that the swell organ had 13 stops each with 73 pipes, and con-

tained "some of the most beautiful string tones such as viola orchestra, viol celeste, as well as oboe and vox humana." The choir division had nine stops including "wood-wind instruments such as clarinet, piccolo and flutes, and also the horns." It was noted that "the pedal tones are especially fine. The musical quality and color will speak for themselves."

The Dedicatory Recital was Monday, December 8, 1924, when the great American organist, Clarence Eddy, gave a concert of classical and modern music. "Thus from the beginning, the new organ has responded to the touch of artists producing the richest quality of music from the world's greatest composers." In the spring of 1925, A. Cyril Graham was engaged as music director. He was also the Director of the Augustana Conservatory of Music and each Sunday morning, preceding the worship services, he gave a short organ recital.

As the Great Depression deepened, cuts hit the music ministry of First Presbyterian Church. In 1933 the music budget was cut from \$2,430 to \$1,080, completely eliminating the paid quartet. This was accompanied by a discontinuation of *The Broadcaster*, a \$3,260 dollar reduction in benevolences and a 15% cut in all salaries.

By the church's centennial in 1939, the ministry of music, long under the direction of Oscar L. Gustafson, included the work of five choirs in which over two hundred volunteer singers were enrolled. "Our singing shall be to the glory of God," was the watchword of the morning worship services, with compensation in terms of musical experience and spiritual growth. During this period Grace E. Smith was the church organist and her assistant was Laurance Smith.

Oscar Gustafson left in 1942 to take over war duties at the Norfolk Naval Base. Phillip B. McDermott became the next choir director. In 1944 chimes were purchased from memorial funds. Dr. McDermott resigned in October, 1948, to fulfill increasing duties as a teacher of organ at Augustana College and was succeeded by Robert Newell. Laurance Smith became organist in 1953. The annual report listed seven regular choirs and two part-time groups, with combined membership of 370.

In 1956, the trustees presented a study of the physical needs of the church. The result was the launching of a \$200,000 modernization program, the first stage completed in the Spring of 1958 with the rebuilding of the 1924 organ by the Stannke Organ Company of Rock Island. An antiphonal organ division was installed by the Temple Organ Company in 1967 as a bequest from Beatrice Conrad.

In October of 1976, the session formed a special committee to evaluate the sanctuary organ. Committee members were Phil Aley (Minister of Music), Ruth E. Baker (Organist), Don Arp, Hobart Darbyshire, Mary Gruhl, June Kirlin, Merritt Milligan, Joan McKay (Chairperson), Charles Turner and Allen Wirtz (Pastor). The committee considered yet another re-build of the 1924 instrument as well

as electronic instruments. After carefully examining eleven organ companies, and visiting twenty-one installations in fourteen cities, the Casavant Frères Limitée pipe organ company of Quebec, Canada was chosen for the project. A new organ was approved by the congregation on Sunday, October 8, 1978. The cost for the new 45-rank organ project was \$184,872, and was covered by organ pledges from the church members over a two to three year period.

The expenses of the Casavant Opus 3455 were fully-subscribed by the congregation and it was dedicated in a service on Sunday, April 13, 1980. The service of worship was played by organist, Ruth E. Baker. Doris Eicher, a well known organist from Baltimore, Maryland, played dedicatory recital pieces by Bach, Franck, Langlais and Messiaen. Famous organists who have concertized on the organ include Gillian Weir, Frederick Swann, Diane Bish and Thomas Murray.

In early 1991 it was determined that the broadened scope of the music ministry was requiring more flexibility than the 1980 installation allowed. In particular, a solid state combination action was needed to meet the needs of both service and recital playing. Funding became available when the estate gift of Alfred and Alice Magnusson to First Presbyterian was designated for an upgrade of the organ. This generous bequest, supplemented by their daughter Jane, allowed for the conversion of the console to solid-state as well as 13 new ranks of pipes and an entirely new Solo Division. MIDI computer access opens the organ to new technology of the next millennium. The Magnusson Memorial Organ was completed with its dedication on March 22, 1998.

In 1924 it was stated that "The organ (of First Presbyterian) is the largest and finest church instrument in the Tri-Cities." In 1998 it can again be stated: "The organ of First Presbyterian Church, Davenport, Iowa is the largest and finest church instrument in the Quad-Cities." TO GOD BE THE GLORY!

Worship Insights: Violet is the predominant color for Lent symbolizing the passion of Jesus. Violet speaks of royalty (Jesus as King of kings), of sacrifice, of weeping, of sadness. The rough-hewn Latin cross draped with the violet shroud and entwined with vines and thorns reminds the worshiper of the crucifixion tree upon which the Son of God was murdered. It is not like the ornate Greek crosses on the back wall and ceiling of the chancel. (It is interesting to note that the present chancel crosses were created in 1924 during the Byzantine-like renovation, the first to follow the original 1899 dedication. The roughhewn cross has been assembled from 1899 lumber found in the upper level of the chapel during recent reconstruction. It comes from the era when a "two by four" truly measured two inches by four inches -unlike today's skimpy "two by fours".) The hymns of Lent focus the worshiper on the passion story, on the struggles and teachings of Jesus, and his sacrifice on the cross. The prayer of confession includes the plaintive Kyrie Eleison emphasizing the worshiper's cry for God to have mercy upon the penitent sinner. The alleluias have been set aside until Easter to proclaim Jesus' resurrection. (Except for today.)

Tours of the First Church facility are offered following the 9 o'clock service. Meet a tour docent near the pulpit at the left front of the Sanctuary about 10:05 AM. The tour takes approximately one-half hour.

The flowers in the chancel today are given to the glory of God in loving memory of Alice Maxwell, wife, Mr. & Mrs. W.G. Maxwell, parents, and Dr. George D. Maxwell, grandfather, by the George Maxwell Family.
