Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847)

Mendelssohn's interest in the organ comes from his great enthusiasm for the music of Bach. English publishers, Conventry and Hollier, commissioned Mendelssohn to write three voluntaries for the organ. Not being familiar with this form, he named these compositions sonatas. This sonata is one of six sonatas compiled by the composer sometime between 1844 and 1845.



FANTASY ON A KYRIE (1982)

William Krape

This composition is based on a 12th century Gregorian chant. It is in free form and is in an improvisational style. It allows for individual colors of the organ to be heard.



FLOURISH FOR AN OCCASION

William Henry Harris (1883-1973)

William Henry Harris served as organist at New College, Christ Church Cathedral in Oxford, and St. George Chapel at Windsor Castle. He is known mostly for his choral music. He did, however, write several compositions for the organ. This piece is one of his most expansive works.



IN PARADISUM (FROM REQUIEM) Gabriel Fauré (1845-1924)

Fauré's Requiem has endeared itself to many church congregations. The last movement, Into Paradise, is a beautifully crafted work . . . it captures the mood of the text in an unforgettable way. The famous French organist, Marcel Dupré (1886-1971), made a very successful arrangement for organ.

The text follows:

May the angels lead you into paradise;
May the Martyrs welcome you upon your arrival,
and lead you into the holy city of Jerusalem.
May a choir of angels welcome you,
and, with poor Lazarus of old,
may you have eternal rest.



Prelude and Fugue in F Minor BWV 534 J.S. Bach (1685-1750)

The Prelude and Fugue in F Minor presents a dramatic and grandiose atmosphere. The key of F minor was a dark and tragic tonality of the Baroque period of music. It has been suggested that this work might have been written for use during Passiontide. It was composed while Bach was organist in Weimar, Germany during the years of 1708-1717.



ANDANTE SOSTENUTO (FROM SYMPHONIE GOTHIQUE)

Charles-Marie Widor (1844-1937)

The Symphonie Gothique premiered in 1895. Although Widor denied that the work described any church in particular, it seems to have been inspired by the beautiful Church of St. Ouen in Rouen, France. Widor was greatly influenced by Wagner, and this lush composition may have been inspired by the opera, Tristan and Isolde.

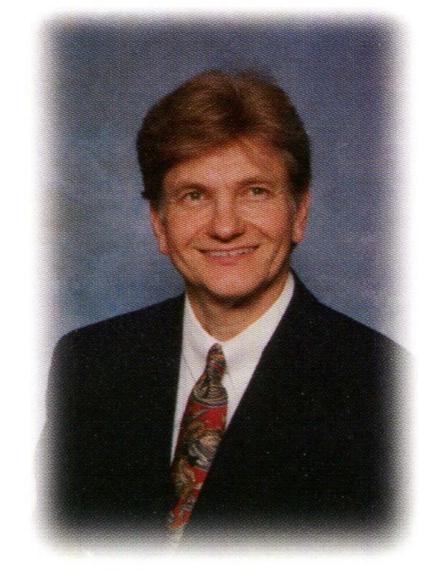


TOCCATA (FROM SYMPHONY #5 IN F MAJOR)

Charles-Marie Widor (1844-1937)

French organ composers of the 19th century used the word symphony to designate a large scale work for the organ in which the instrument was used in an orchestral fashion. While exploring the many colors of the instrument, they created many diversified compositions. The Toccata is perhaps the most famous work of Widor. It is the final movement of Symphony #5. Because of its perpetual motion, it has become the epitome of the French toccata style.
