The German Romantic composer, Karg-Elert wrote this festive piece in such a way that the organ takes on the role of a symphony orchestra. The pedal notes imitate the trombone and tympani. Trumpet fanfares and light flute sections from the antiphonal organ are interspersed with the full orchestral sections of the chancel organ.







Trumpet Voluntary

Henry Heron

THE ROLL OF THE SECTION

Henry Heron was an 18th century English composer. The voluntary is an English term meaning a musical work which may be, but not required to be played as a part of the church service. The first movement is played on the new Principal 8' stop in the antiphonal organ. The antiphonal Trompette-de-fête is used in the second movement and is accompanied by the antiphonal principal chorus. This particular combination was not possible before the renovation of the organ console.

Liebster Jesu, wir sind hier, BWV 731

J. S. Bach

In this setting, the highly-ornamented chorale melody is played by the right hand on a penetrating combination of stops known as the cornet. This is new to the organ and is useful in many colorful ways. Two settings of this chorale are hymns 187 and 248 in the LBW.

Three Pieces for Musical Clocks

Franz Josef Haydn

These delightful pieces are from a set of twelve written by Haydn in 1792 for a famous clock in Vienna. They were played automatically on a small flute organ, operated by the clock mechanism.

Carillon

Leo Sowerby

The impression of bells is created by Leo Sowerby in this piece written in 1917. A poetic piece, it begins with the lush and gentle string stops and gradually builds to the rich and powerful full organ. The bell motive is played on the chimes in both the manuals and pedals. The organ chimes could not be played in the pedal until the renovation of the organ console.

The Gift to Be Simple

Dale Wood

This melody is found in many hand-copied collections of Shaker tunes dating between 1837 and 1847. This spirited setting utilizes various colors of the organ including the Zimbelstern, which consists of small bells which are randomly rung by a playing mechanism.

Now Thank We All Our God

Piet Post

This festive setting of Johann Crüger's majestic hymn demonstrates the glorious full organ including the antiphonal Trompette-de-fête.

He will come again to judge the living and the dead.


