Frederick Swann

or 25 years Frederick Swann was organist of the internationally famous Riverside Church in New York City. During the final 16 years of his tenure he was also Director of Music and conducted one of the outstanding music programs in the city.

In 1982 he was appointed Organist and Director of Music of the Crystal Cathedral in Garden Grove, California. As chief musician for "the Hour of Power" - seen weekly on TV by millions of people world-wide - he became the most visible and widely heard organist in the world. Upon retirement in 1998 Mr. Swann was named Organist Emeritus of the Cathedral, and accepted the position of Organist-in-Residence at First Congregational Church of Los Angeles. First Congregational Church supports a distinguished music program and houses one of the largest pipe organs in the world, the third world-renowned instrument over which Mr. Swann has presided.

Mr. Swann's long career has included engagements in all 50 of the United States, in major churches, concert halls, and cathedrals throughout the North America, Europe and Asia. He has performed with prestigious orchestras and collaborated with renowned choral organizations.



Richard Herr

ichard Herr is beginning his 30th Year as Organist and Director of Music Ministries at First Presbyterian Church of Tyler. He is an accomplished conductor, organist, harpsichordist, pianist and is the organizer of the Musical Arts Series which will feature 11 major musical events this season. He has been the Conductor and Artistic Director of the Tyler Civic Chorale for 27 years. He is a dominant force in the choral music of East Texas and is responsible for many premieres of major choral works in the area including the Bach *B Minor Mass*, the complete and authentic *Messiah* accompanied by Baroque period instruments, and most recently the East Texas premiere of *Lux Aeterna* by Morten Lauridsen. He is the Principal Keyboard for the East Texas Symphony Orchestra and has appeared with the symphony as guest conductor. For many years he was the conductor of the University of Texas at Tyler Chamber Orchestra. He is past Dean of the East Texas Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. The Mayor of Tyler proclaimed *Richard Herr Day* in honor of his accomplishments.

Mr. Herr received his degree in Music Education from Bradley University in Peoria, Illinois. For graduate work, he studied with Robert Anderson at Southern Methodist University where he received his Master of Sacred Music Degree in 1969. From there he went to West Point, N.Y., where he served in the Army as Director of Music and Organist at the Catholic Chapel. He has been in Tyler since 1971. His musical offerings through First Presbyterian Church of Tyler, the Tyler Civic Chorale and other organizations have had a profound influence on worship through music and on the cultural development of the arts in East Texas.

Jeffrey Ford

Leffrey Ford is the Organist/Associate Director of Music at Marvin United Methodist Church in Tyler where his responsibilities also include overseeing the handbell ensembles.

Mr. Ford earned a Bachelor of Arts in Church Music and Organ Performance from Asbury College, Wilmore, Kentucky and a Masters of Music in Organ Performance from Southwestern

Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas.

He has participated in organ master classes with David Higgs and the late Russell Saunders. In 1995 he participated in an organist exchange with organist David Poulter at Coventry Cathedral where he spent 6 weeks playing and working with the trial boys of the choir. Presently he is at the end of a two-month sabbatical from Marvin Church.

Tom Froelich

om Froelich received his Bachelor of Music *cum laude* from Lawrence University and his Master of Music from Northwestern University. For three years he lived in Paris where he was a student of Marie-Claire Alain while also serving as organist-choirmaster for St. Michael's Church (Church of England). Other teachers have included Miriam Clapp Duncan, Anton Heiller, Wolfgang Rübsam, Jean Langlais, and Charles Brown.



Mr. Froelich has appeared as solo recitalist with orchestras and at music festivals throughout the United States and in Europe and has also been featured as a clinician at the Montreat (NC) Conferences on Worship and Music sponsored by the Presbyterian Association of Musicians. He has been heard on NPR's "Pipedreams" and is seen regularly on the televised services of the historic First Presbyterian Church of Dallas where he has been organist since 1977.

Keith Weber



eith Weber has served as Director of Music of Christ Episcopal Church in Tyler since 1988. A native of western Pennsylvania, he holds a B.M., *cum laude*, in Organ Performance from Southern Methodist University; an M.M. also from SMU and an M.S.M from Perkins School of Theology. Keith oversees an active program at Christ Church including the renowned *Grace Note Music Series*, serves on the Music Commission of the Episcopal Diocese of Texas, is past Dean of the East Texas Chapter, American Guild of Organists, has served on the Board of Directors of the Tyler Civic Chorale,

and is known throughout the nation for his unique musical versatility - as organist, pianist, harpsichordist, collaborator, conductor, vocal coach, choral clinician and consultant.

As an organist, Mr. Weber won the Dora Poteet Barclay Award (Outstanding Undergraduate, SMU), the Roy and Sue Johnson Award (Outstanding Senior, SMU), the 1982 B'nai B'rith Music Scholarship, the 1991 Region VII National Young Artists' Playing Competition of the American Guild of Organists, was named finalist of the 1992 Spivey International Organ Competition and is widely known for his engaging organ recital programming. He served as Interim Organist at the Meyerson Symphony Center in Dallas.




































About Casavant Frères Limitée

ccording to the most recent edition of the *Encyclopedia of Music in Canada*, the first Canadian born organ builder of note was Joseph Casavant. A blacksmith by trade, he decided at the age of twenty-seven to give up his business in St. Hyacinthe and enter the Collège Ste. Thérèse. While a student he was asked by l'abbé Bucharme to restore an old organ to working condition. The copy of the 1766 treatise by Dom Bédos *L'Art du Facteur d'Orgues* which he used as the guide for his first organ building venture remains today in the archives of the firm established by his sons. In 1840, Joseph Casavant received his first contract for an entirely new organ and by the time of his retirement in 1866 he had produced some seventeen organs for churches and seminaries.

Before Mr. Casavant's death in 1874, his two sons, Claver and Samuel, had decided to become organ builders. To prepare for their lifework, the brothers apprenticed with the outstanding organ builders of the day. They also traveled widely in Europe, visiting builders and significant organs in France, Italy, Switzerland, Germany, Belgium and England.

Upon their return in 1879, they established Casavant Frères on the site where the present workshops still stand in St. Hyacinthe, Quebec, Canada and have, in the 120 years since, built nearly 3800 organs.

Today, Casavant employs some eighty artisans and craftsmen who produce ten to twelve instruments per year - no two alike in design or construction. All components of each organ are hand crafted as they have been for over a century. New workers are brought on staff as senior personnel approach retirement. Each new employee is interviewed by the president and, once employed, must proceed through an apprenticeship program lasting from five to seven years. Working alongside master artisans, they develop their craft and methods which are passed from generation to generation - often in the same family.


Each year the majority of Casavant organs built are modest two and three manual instruments installed in churches in small towns and large cities throughout North America. In addition, there are generally one or two larger instruments plus a number of projects restoring and providing additions or modifications to Casavant organs of all vintages where attention is paid to enhancing the musical aspects while respecting the original design. New technology such as solid-state combination and switching systems, multiplex, multi-memory level combination actions and MIDI have been adopted and other improvements continue to be incorporated.

During their lifetime, the brothers Casavant established the finest traditions of craftsmanship and loyalty among their employees and a strong organization to carry on those traditions after them. This organization continues today to stand for the artistic integrity and painstaking care which the Casavant brothers cherished and fostered.
