Prof. Baldwin retired amidst loud applause, making way for Homer Warren and Robert H. Murray, who rendered Faure's "Crucifix" in fine style. Prof. Buldwin next gave an organ andante with variations, arranged by himself, appearing again with Wagner's "Pilgersang" from "Tannhaenser," Batiste's grand opertoire and Baldwin's "Storm." "Shepherd's Evering Song," "The Tem-"The and "Hymn of Thanksgiving." closing with Haydn's "Heavens are Telling." Homer Warren sang Adams' "Star of Bethtehem" and Mrs. Chas. Wright, Paul Rodney's "Calvary," both appearing soon after with Henry Smart's fine old hymn, "The Lord is My Shepherd."
