A MASS MEETING of Chicago Jews called in the interest of the international Zionist movement was held last Sunday afternoon in Temple B'nai Abraham, 567 N. Marshfield avenue. The meeting was addressed by Assistant State's Attorney Louis Zeisler, president of the order. Mr. Zeisler asked the support of Chicago Jews for the proposition made at a recent convention of the order by Congressman Richard Bartholdt, of St. Louis, in which he urged that the Jews of every nation unite in bringing Zeisler to the attention of The Hague peace tribunal as a possible solution of the Jewish problem.

Six hundred members of the Independent Order of Sons of Benjamin attended the installation of officers of the Chicago lodge, held last Sunday afternoon at the Unity club. In the evening a banquet was given by the joint lodges of the city in honor of Abraham Rosenbloom of New York, grand master of the order. After the banquet, addresses were made by Mr. Rosenbloom on "Our Order," Judge Julian W. Mack on "Jewish Charities," Miss Miriam F. Low of the bureau of personal service on "Child Saving," the Rev. A. R. Levy on "The Religious Aspect of American Jewry," and Judge Sabbath on "Fraternal Societies." A ball followed the banquet.

Architect of the new B'nai B'r. Temple, of which we have given a somewhat detailed description in our issue of August 26, 1905, is now occupied by the Auditorium with a seating capacity of 750 persons. At the rear of the Auditorium is a large gallery with paneled rail and supported on iron columns and in the front is the choir gallery. Below this choir gallery is the orchestra in the rear of which is the really carved and paneled box.

From the four corners of the Auditorium rise large ornamental columns from which spring four immense arches supported on heavily carved brackets. These arches extend entirely across the auditorium and rise majestically to a height of about thirty feet. Here, passing gracefully to the ceiling with paneled plaster covers. The entire building and ornaments are in carved oak in the Romanesque and Byzantine style.

In the rear of the structure is a large corridor at one end of which is the Rabbi's study fitted up with bookcases. From the corridor we also enter the large dining hall, kitchen and assembly hall.

At the further end of the corridor joins the side stair hall from which the Directories' room is entered, and a large stair way leads to the second story, in which the exterior is built of dark red face brick with terra cotta trimmings in the Romanesque style.

Mr. Weiss has made good his word given us a year ago: "Your Temple will be one of the finest modern edifices in St. Louis."

Although still unable to give any account of her wandering or a reason for her remaining away from her home so long, Mrs. Zeisler to-day acts and talks in a perfectly rational manner, her appetite is good and condition is apparently normal. She has been ordered by her physician, Dr. M. J. Goodkind, to remain quiet and to deny herself all visitors, even her most intimate friends. Great solicitude for her welfare has been expressed from many quarters, and the family is kept busy meeting visitors who call to inquire about Mrs. Zeisler's condition. "We feel greatly encouraged to-day," said Miss Rose Kanzer, a cousin of the musician, who resides at the Zeisler residence. "With absolute quiet and a change of scene we believe she will improve rapidly, and soon be her old brilliant self. Mr. and Mrs. Zeisler will leave in a few days for the South, where it is hoped the climate will be of benefit to her. She was wrapped up head and soul in her music, and the fear that she would eventually go blind and be compelled to give up her career caused her to become temporarily insane." Mr. Zeisler felt so encouraged over the change in his wife to-day that he left early in the morning for his office.
