

# The Alice M. Ford Memorial Consecration Concert of the Reuter Organ

First United Methodist Church Cheyenne, Wyoming March 20, 1994

## The Organ Story . . .

The Reuter Organ will be the fourth organ to grace the 100 year old sanctuary of The First United Methodist Church. From 1894 through 1903 a small pump organ was used. This organ was located against the front wall of the sanctuary until replaced in the winter of 1903-04 by a Felgemaker pipe organ. Forty-two years later, during the winter of 1945-46, the Felgemaker organ was replaced by the M.P. Moller pipe organ, a gift to the church by Sam Keener in honor of his mother, Jennie Voss Keener McQuown. The Moller organ contained 1,103 pipes, 738 of which remained from the 1903-04 Felgemaker pipe organ. Over 250 of the original Felgemaker pipes and over 180 of the Moller pipes are in the new Reuter Organ.

## **F**rom the Builder . . .

The Reuter organ built for First United Methodist Church, Cheyenne, Wyoming in 1994, is the Reuter Organ Company's opus #2164. This handcrafted instrument was created in Lawrence, Kansas by the firm's fifty craftsmen and musicians, and represents nearly 6,000 man-hours. It was designed by Reuter's Regional Consultant, David R. Salmen, and all scaling and voicing as well as the visual design were under his direction.

Since its founding in 1917, the Reuter Organ Company has constructed over 2,200 new instruments and has rebuilt and added to several thousand others. This organ contains 1,637 individual pipes composing its 21 stops - 27 ranks. Reuter has used the latest solid state switching design which allows for a transposer and Musical Instrument Digital Interface (MIDI). The 32 levels of combination action memory provide the organist with 640 general combination pistons. The console and matching new casework were constructed of quarter-sawn oak. The interior of the console is in walnut. The manual keyboard naturals are covered with bone, while the sharps are of rosewood.


The eight speaking stops (11 ranks) of the Great organ are in a central cantilevered position above the choir loft. These voices form the tonal center which will lead the congregation in singing. The large copper pipes form the bass octave of the 8' Great Principal and 8' Pedal Principal, and their special coloring was achieved by flaming and heating the copper with an acetelyne torch during construction. Flanking the copper pipes is the bass octave of the 8' Gemshorn. The tapered body of this stop aids in the production of a clean, quiet accompaniment voice. The balance of the Great division's 671 pipes is divided in a nearly symetrical layout, and include flutes which have capped and partially capped pipe bodies. The caps are distinctive, as red felt forms the seal between the pipe body and the cap.

As is evident, many different woods and metals are specifically chosen to form the tonal requirements of the voices they are to produce. Reuter builds metal pipes longer than 4' in length in either copper or zinc. Pipes shorter than 4' are of specific alloys of tin and lead cast in the Reuter pipeshop. The shape of the pipe body, as well as its diameter, determine the color of the tone produced. The pipe body may either be capped or open, cylindrical or conical. Its length determines its pitch. Open metal pipes have tin tuning slides or "collars" which may be raised or lowered to alter the pitch. Behind the organ screen are the pipes of the Swell and Pedal organs. These pipes, totaling nearly 1000, range in length from 16' to sizes smaller than a pencil. Also contained within the organ case is the 2 hp blower which supplies the wind to the organ's five reservoirs.

The installation of the organ was accomplished within two weeks by David Salmen, Wessington Springs, SD; Stephen Barnhart, St. Louis Park, MN, and Ken DeJong, Bellevue, WA. The Reuter team was assisted by the volunteer efforts of many members of the church, and sincere appreciation is given to the dedicated people who gave of their time, talents and treasure in the planning, preparation and installation of this new worship instrument.

## **H**rederick Hohman

is a well regarded organ recitalist and recording artist. A native of St. Louis, MO, and born of musician parents in 1955, Frederick Hohman entered the University of Rochester's Eastman School of Music in 1974 as an



undergraduate scholarship student in the organ class of David Craighead. Remaining at Eastman, he now holds Eastman's Performer's Certificate, Mus.B., M.M. and D.M.A. degrees. In 1984, he was named the First Prize Winner in the Eighth National Organ-Playing Competition (Mader Foundation, Pasadena, CA) and in the Arthur Polster Memorial Organ-Playing Competition (American Guild of Organists, Syracuse, NY).

Hohman's 1984 doctoral essay, "The Art of the Symphonic Organist," and his 1985 recording, Lemare Affair (Pro Organo CD7007) ignited a revival in symphonic literature and organ performance practices. The success of these works led to his recording of more symphonic organ music and transcriptions and to the publication, by Wayne Leupold Editions, of a new organ transcription series bearing his name. In 1992, a critic with The Diapason had acclaimed him as "the symphonic organ's strongest exponent."


Until recently, Dr. Hohman served as organist and choirmaster in Protestant churches and taught organ at the South Bend campus of Indiana University; however, he resigned these positions in 1983 in order to return to his devotion to touring

and recording. During this current season, he is making 3 new recordings and performing more than 30 solo engagements. Frederick Hohman is occasionally featured on the *Pipedreams* radio broadcast from American Public Radio. His CD releases are broadcast in all English-speaking countries and have won critics' favor with *The Absolute Sound, Gramophone, Fanfare, The American Organist* and Britain's *Musical Opinion*. Between tours, Hohman relaxes at home with his wife, Elizabeth, in South Bend, IN.

## A lice M. Ford

It is a distinct honor to name this Consecration Concert of the Reuter Organ in memory of Alice Mary Ford. Alice was born on July 18, 1910 in Waukegan, IL and passed away in Cheyenne, WY on May 29, 1993. She earned a Bachelor of Science Degree at Iowa State, a Master's Degree at Colorado State University and pursued post-graduate studies at the University of Wyoming. A devoted and inspiring educator, she taught in Council Bluffs, IA; Lovell, WY and in the Cheyenne schools from 1946 until her retirement in 1970.

Home Economics was Alice's vocation and travel her avocation. She visited France, England, Finland and most of the United States. Alice was a gracious person and wise steward of resources. Willingly she contributed of herself and her substance to individuals and institutions. First United Methodist Church is grateful for Alice's bequest in both her faithful service and generous gift.


