The New Organ for St. John's Church.

The new organ for St. John's Episcopal church—said to be a very fine instrument of great compass and power—is expected to arrive here about the 10th of next month; and the following description of the instrument has been kindly furnished to us for publication:

The builders are Messrs. Steere & Turner, Springfield, Mass., and the organ is 12 feet 6 inches wide, 18 feet high and 8 feet 6 inches deep; it weighs 7,000 lbs., and will fill a railway box-car. Its front pipes will all speak, and are to be richly decorated in gold and colors; it will have 2 manuals or key-boards and 127 sub-bass pedal pipes. Compass of manuals (C to A), 58 notes; compass of pedals (C to D), 27 notes.

Great organ (1st man.)-1. Open diapason;

2. Dulciana; 3. Stop diapason; 4. Melodea;

5. Octave; 6. Sup. Octave.

Swell organ (2nd man.)—7. Open diapason; 8. Salicional; 9. Stop diap. bass; 10. Stop diap. treble; 11. Flute harmonique; 12. Oboe; 13. Bassoon; 14. Tremulant.

Pedal Organ—15. Bourdon (16 feet); 16. Manual comp.; 17. 1st man, to ped. comp.; 18. 2nd man, to ped. comp.; 19. Blower's signal.

Pedal Movements—1. Forte; 2. Piano; 3. Balac'd swell pedal.

A church choir association has been formed to take charge of the church music on the arrival of the organ, the object being to provide a permanent double chorus and quartette choir for the Church. Rev. Dr. J. C. Huske is ex officio chairman, Mr. F. R. Rose organist, Mr. H. R. Novitzky precentor and choir master, and Mr. E. T. B. Glenn secretary and treasurer.
