The new organ for the Episcopal Church is unpacked and in process of erection by Mr. Chas. S. Hahn, Tuner, of Nashville. This splendid instrument was constructed by Mr. Charles F. Durner, of Quakertown, Penn.; it received a special prize at the Centennial Exposition, in 1876. It consists of the following stops:

Grand Organ-Bourdon, Open Diapason (metal), Stopped Diapa-(wood), Principal, Flute, Twelfth, and Fifteenth.

Swell Organ-Stopped Diapason, Dulciana, Kohrs Flute, Alpine Horn, and Clarinet.

The compass of each of these stops runs the whole length of the keyboard. In addition, the pedal stops are: AND LANGE !

Sub Bass and Violin Bass, each comprising twenty-seven pipes.

The key-board is constructed on the improved plan, which enables the organist to face the audience, and all the most recent mechanical improvements have been incorporated which characterize the best instruments of the present day.
