THE ORGAN DEDICATION

S was expected, the ceremony of dedication of the pipe organ given to the Museum by Mrs. Edward C. Blum was an impressive one and was very fitting as the first important event of the season. There was an audience of fifteen hundred and the scene in the large Sculpture Court, where the audience sat, was a lovely one, especially when seen from the gallery. The audience sat facing the organ, which is installed in the southeast corner of the Court. There was a wide aisle down the middle passing around the large fountain pool in the center of the room, the rim of which was entirely covered for this occasion with plants and greens.

Mrs. Blum was presented to the audience by Dr. Fox, Director of the Museum, and made a short address of presentation. The organ was accepted for the Museum by Mr. Walter H. Crittenden, Chairman of the Museum's Governing Committee and for the City by Mr. Strassberger, Assistant Corporation Counsel, who represented the Mayor.

Immediately after these addresses Dr. Lynnwood Farnam began his program of an hour. His selections for this initial recital were:

Toccata in G Major...H. B. Jepson Rondo—Soeur Monique..... Francois Coupperin Trumpet—Tune and Air..... Henry Purcell Quasi Lento and Adagio from Fantasie in C, Op. 16..... César Franck Presto (jig) from Fifth Organ Concerto......G. F. Handel "In Dulci Jubilo" (Chorale Prelude in G) F. S. Bach Divertissement (MS)..... H. L. Baumgartner "The Moon" from Mirrored "Seven Pastels from Constance"...Sigfrid Karg-Elert "Vintage" from "Les heures bourguignonnes"..Georges Jacob

After the recital a great many from the audience went into the gallery to see the console.

The public is now receiving the benefit of this unusual gift in the form of two or three free recitals a month on Sunday afternoons.

In the words of the Brooklyn Standard Union:

"The Brooklyn Museum is the first in the East to have the benefit of Sunday musical concerts in the artistic atmosphere of paintings and sculpture."
