



A word about the project...

rom the earliest contact with our firm, which came as an e-mail from organist Kay Sendrey on October 31, 2003, informing us that Schantz Organ Company was being considered as a potential builder of a new pipe organ, we knew that the Custer Road United Methodist Church organ project would be special for our firm. Beginning with that initial e-mail, this project has been conducted with the highest level of professionalism. Each step of the process — initial inquiry, selection as the builder, final specification and contract negotiations — has been a perfect example of organization, efficiency and exemplary contractor/client relations.





he Schantz Organ Company was founded in 1873 by A. J. Tschantz (later changed to Schantz), the son of immigrants from Switzerland. After a brief venture into the construction of reed organs, Tschantz became interested in the pipe organ and soon began building them. His three sons joined him in the family business and subsequently turned the operations over to their sons. From these humble beginnings, the small family business has grown into an internationally known firm, America's oldest and largest pipe organ builder still under management of the founding family.



The overall quality of the finished pipe organ is only as good as the materials utilized in its construction. Thus, Schantz Organ employs only the highest quality materials available. A talented and experienced staff oversees the construction of nearly every component, including the blower that supplies air to the instrument, wind lines, reservoirs, windchests, pipes, console, and organ cases. In this way Schantz artisans control quality throughout the entire construction process from initial design to the first notes played.








CUSTER ROAD UMC Music Ministry






Today's choral and instrumental offerings are provided by groups within Custer Road UMC's diverse and expansive music ministry. Since the church's inception 26 years ago, music has played a vital role in providing opportunities for spiritual, personal and musical growth. Custer Road UMC's music ministry includes the adult *Chancel Choir* and youth *Revelation Choir*, five adult yocal ensembles, seven children's choirs, seven hand bell choirs, six adult instrumental ensembles and two youth instrumental ensembles. These dynamic groups continually provide a broad variety of inspirational music for worship under the exceptional direction of Reverend Timothy Morrison, CRUMC Minister of Music since 1985, and the outstanding accompaniment of Kay Sendrey, Church Organist since 1983.







Bradley Hunter Welch CONCERT ORGANIST



This afternoon's guest organist is Bradley Hunter Welch, whom *The American Organist* calls "a world-class virtuoso." A native of Knoxville, Tenn., Welch began playing the piano at age 10 and organ at age 13.

In 1997, he graduated magna cum laude with a bachelor's degree in organ performance and won the Dean's Award for Outstanding Performance at Baylor University.

Welch pursued graduate studies, receiving the Master of Music degree in organ performance from Yale University School of Music/Institute of Sacred Music in 1999. A year later, he earned the Artist Diploma and was awarded the Horatio Parker Memorial Prize, the most prestigious prize

awarded by the Yale faculty. That year, he received the Master of Musical Arts degree, having completed all class work for Yale's Doctor of Musical Arts degree.

While at Yale, he also received the Robert Baker Prize, given to an incoming organ student considered among the top two percent of the nation's young organists, the Charles Ives Prize, and the Yale School of Music Alumni Association Prize.

Among notable competitions which have brought Bradley to the attention of the music world: first place in the undergraduate division of the William Hall Organ Competition in San Antonio in 1994; national finalist in the organ division of the Music Teachers National Association competition in 1995; first place in the American Guild of Organists Region VII Competition for Young Organists in 1995; first place winner and recipient of the Audience Prize in the Dallas International Organ Competition in 2003 (also won the Audience Prize in 2000); and featured artist at three regional conventions of The American Guild of Organists in 2005. He made his European debut in 2005 at the Chartres Festival in France.

Welch currently serves as organist and artist-in-residence at Highland Park United Methodist Church in Dallas.
