

The members of the committee to restore and enhance the organ join the Provost and Canon to the Ordinary at the front of the center aisle, and say:

Dean Haverland and Canon Steenson, on behalf of the Wardens, Vestry and People of the Cathedral Church of St. John, we present to you this organ to be set apart for the service of Christ's holy Church through the worship and outreach of this Cathedral Church, and the ministry of the Diocese of the Rio Grande.

The Provost then leads the following versicles:

And of thine own have we given Thee. Prosper thou the work of our hands;

Prosper thou our handiwork.

Almighty God, we thank thee that thou hast put it into the hearts of thy people to make offerings for thy service, and have been pleased to accept their gifts. Be with us now and bless us as we set apart this organ to thy praise and glory, in memory of loved ones, and in thanksgiving for the many blessings bestowed upon the same; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

The Provost and the Canon to the Ordinary then offer incense and sprinkle the organ with Holy Water.

The Canon to the Ordinary then leads the following versicle:

The Procession proceeds to the Antiphonal Organ during which Psalm 150 is said responsively:

Hallelujah!

Leader:

Let us pray.

O Lord, before whose throne trumpets sound, and saints and angels sing the songs of Moses and the Lamb: Accept this organ for the worship of thy temple, that with the voice of music we may proclaim thy praise and tell it abroad; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
