Built in 1928 in Hagerstown, Maryland, the Moller pipe organ at Ross Memorial Presbyterian Church was comprised of 9 ranks of pipes enclosed in a chamber on the upper right of the chancel. In the 1970s the Moller company revised the organ and provided a new console. The Ross organ now lives in the Northminster gallery behind the expression shades. The 1970s console was completely rebuilt in this project with solid state components, adding 250 memory levels, transposer, and playback systems. Stops marked * were selected by Smith & Gilbert to complete the specification. They had been part of a 1976 Newcomer organ in First Church of the Nazarene, Washington, DC.
