Biographical Note on Frank J. Daniel, F.A.G.O. (1874-1949):²

Frank Daniel was an organist, pianist, vocal teacher and choir director. Born in Carlisle, England, during his younger years, he lived in Scotland. Daniel emigrated to the United States in 1900, becoming a naturalized citizen some 15 years later.

Initially, he found employment working at Trinity Episcopal Church in Williamsport, Pennsylvania. After a brief time at the Fourth Presbyterian Church in Syracuse, New York, Daniel became organist and choirmaster at St. Peter's Roman Catholic Cathedral in Scranton, Pennsylvania. He served in that position for 37 years and lived in Scranton for 40 years. In addition to his duties as organist and director of the Cathedral Choir, he also served as director of the Scranton Liederkranz Choir.

Frank Daniel was one of the founders of the Northeast Pennsylvania Chapter of the American Guild of Organists and served as the chapter's second dean.
