

**MUSICAL PROGRAM
AT PROCTOR HALL
SATURDAY, DEC. 8**

Announcement is made by the Department of Music of Princeton University of the first chamber music program at Proctor Hall, Graduate College, on Saturday afternoon, December 8, at four o'clock followed by the first carillon recital at five o'clock the same afternoon.

For the chamber music program in Proctor Hall, the Frick organ will be associated for the first time with stringed instruments in a program of seventeenth and eighteenth century music. Dr. Alexander Russell, University Director of Music, will be the organist, assisted by two well known violinists from the Vertchamp String Quartette of New York—Albert Vertchamp and Rudolph Fuchs.

No cards of admission are required, and the recital will be open to the general public.

The Proctor Hall organ was presented to Princeton University in 1916 by the late Henry Clay Frick, and for the past twelve years has been the medium through which over 200 public and private recitals have been given. In addition to the annual series by Dr. Russell, there have been guest recitals by many of the most famous organists of Europe and America, notably Courboin, Dupre, Hollins, Christian, Lanquetuit, Germani, and Gleason. The organ was remodeled in 1927.

Following the Proctor Hall recital Frederick Roche of Morristown will play the first carillon recital of the season on the carillon of thirty-five bells in the Cleveland Tower, beginning at 5 o'clock.

The public is invited to attend both events.
