

WICKS was the first builder to appreciate the need of a compact, inexpensive organ of recognized quality. This was years ago, in 1929. Since then hundreds of these Wicks organs have been shipped to all parts of the world. There probably is one near you.

The experience gained in the building of these many instruments is in a large measure responsible for the superiority of Wicks over the products of others who ignored the small organ buyer until 1934. Engineers of high standards are guided by experience. No amount of theory or data can replace the valuable lessons which experience teaches.

In 1929 an organ costing \$1200.00 was developed. With this unit as a nucleus, new models were added regularly and costs were reduced, until to-day it is possible to obtain a great many models (only three are listed in this circular because of space limitations) at prices starting from \$820.00. No other builder offers such splendid variety. Neither is a greater value obtainable elsewhere.

The organ selling for \$820.00 is called the "Miniature" merely for identification purposes, for console dimensions, pipe scales and general construction compare with any other models. It has splendid variety, as the specifications indicate, plus good volume. If the soft quality of the Dulciana, as furnished in the Sonatina, is not required, the Miniature will prove most satisfactory. The Salicional is kept somewhat soft to serve as a suitable accompaniment for the other voices.

In the "Sonatina" there is a Dulciana in addition to the pipes incorporated in the Miniature. The delicate, silvery quality of the Dulciana is indispensable in many instances. Since the value of the organ is enhanced so greatly by this addition, the Sonatina is highly recommended.

The "Fuga", was developed because of the general demand for an inexpensive instrument with a Diapason. It is proving the most popular model. A rich and dignified character of tone is supplied by the Diapason. The Flute is the same as in the other models, however, the Salicional is softer. The full organ volume is approximately double that of the Sonatina. Words fail to express the true value of this "big" little organ.

To conserve space the lower octave of the Sub Bass consists of large vibrating brass tongues placed in a special sound-box, which gives them a quality of tone like that of a Sub Bass. They should not be confused with regular reed organ reeds because the result is very much superior. If the purchaser prefers the twelve pipes instead they may be included with either case 2N or 3N.

What sized building will these instruments accommodate? Much depends upon acoustical properties. Under

ordinary conditions we are safe in assuming that the Miniature and Sonatina will prove satisfactory in churches seating up to three hundred people, although we have some in larger churches. In view of the increased power of the Fuga it is successful in building seating up to five hundred, provided conditions are ideal. There can be no fixed rule.

The small organs described in this folder are neither of the reed type, nor are they imitation organs. They are **ACTUAL PIPE ORGANS**, constructed of finest materials, guaranteed the same as a \$20,000.00 instrument.

An **ALL ELECTRIC** patented action, used by Wicks since 1914, insures the purchaser of undisturbed service. It is the simplest, most reliable and durable organ action available. There are no leather pneumatics, pouches, channels loose armatures and the like to cause trouble. The Wicks direct electric action eliminates these delicate parts. Neither heat nor cold affect the Wicks action. It will operate satisfactorily in zero weather.

MAINTENANCE EXPENSE IS NEGLIGIBLE due to the reliability of the Wicks direct electric action. Some of our installations have had NO maintenance for from three to five years. They are designed to give service and they do.

TUNING presents NO PROBLEM. The difficulties of tuning has been grossly exaggerated by those who endeavor to discredit the organ in an effort to further the sale of imitations. Pipes get out of tune by the contraction and expansion of metal and wood, however, since worship services are never held in churches with temperatures lower than sixty degrees, the organ will be in tune when used. No matter how cold a church is during the week, when the temperature returns to normal the pipes are in tune and no harm has been done.

OPERATING EXPENSE IS LOW. The motors are very small, consuming no more current than a 200 watt light bulb or washing machine motor.

INSTALLATION IS EASY. Absolutely no building changes or special wiring are necessary. The blower is small, quiet and simple to connect.

SPECIAL DESIGNS are available and Wicks will build an organ to accommodate any space, as well as every purse. If the cases illustrated are not suitable, special designs will be developed. Detached consoles are available, thus the pipes, contained within the case itself in standard models, may be placed in a chamber. Numerous unique residence installations have been made in odd clothes closets, spaces below stairways, basements, second floors and the like.

"EASY TO PLAY" is the expression regularly heard

from owners of Wicks organs. The **AUTOMATIC PEDAL ACCOMPANIMENT** dispels all fears of a beginner because he can get pedal effects without using the pedal keyboard. This mechanism is regarded as one of the cleverest inventions of the century. By means of this device the organist obtains a suitable pedal background by using the manuals in regular fashion. The incorrect pedal note **CAN NOT** be struck if the organ is properly played from the Great manual, the proper pedal tone is automatically played.

MUSIC FOR SMALL ORGANS is available. J. Fischer Brothers, New York City, co-operated with Wicks in publishing a special book of easy organ numbers for a complete service, with registration outlined for small organ. Most organ music is written for large organs, whereas this remarkable book is devoted to the small organ only.

CONSOLES OF STANDARD A. G. O. SPECIFICATIONS are supplied with all Wicks organs. Furthermore the consoles are beautiful to behold - indeed an attractive piece of furniture.

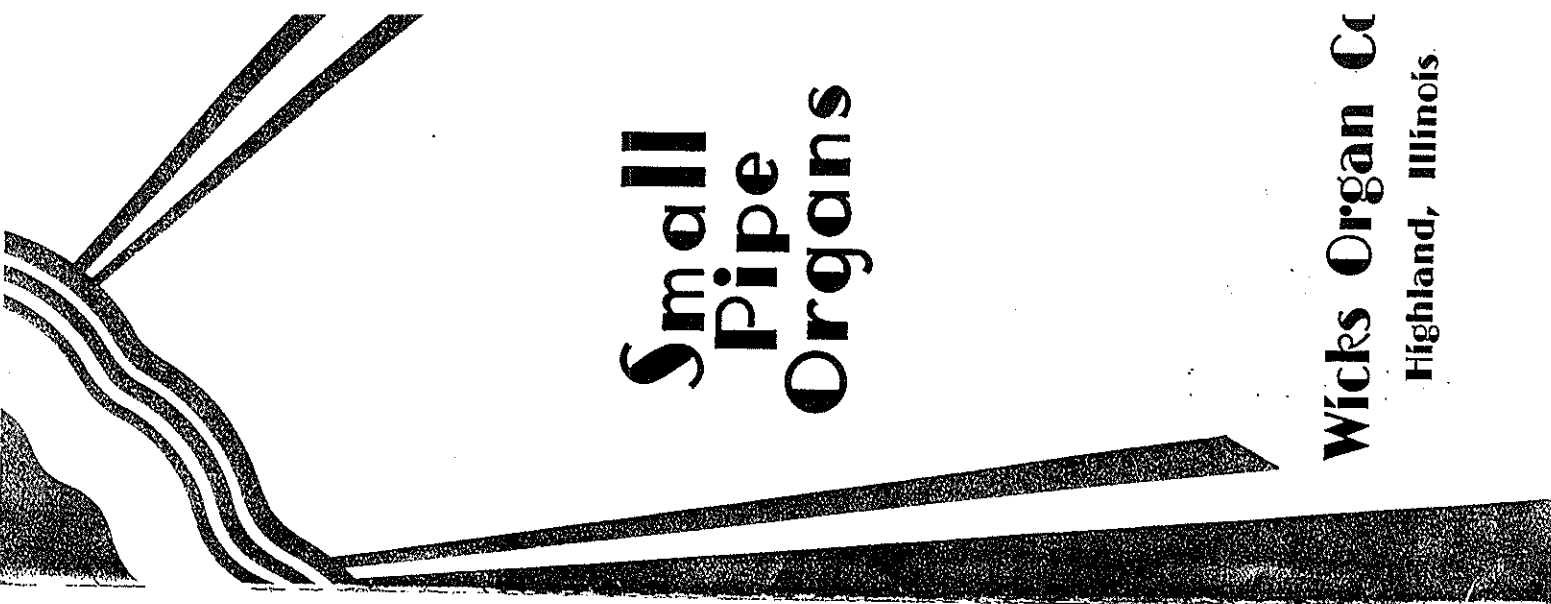
THROUGH ORGAN PIPES ALONE EMANATES THE INTIMABLE GRANDEUR AND BEAUTY OF THE PIPE ORGAN". True organ tones are obtainable only by means of pipes. When pipes are no longer used the instrument is not a pipe organ, as a comparison of tone quality will readily reveal. The imitations are standard except that one installation may have more loud speakers than another. The artist is not swayed by novelties, be he an organist, violinist, pianist or a player of any other instrument. Synthetically produced tones are monotonous and fail to provide any degree of satisfaction for either the player or listener. High cost of the genuine justifies consideration of the imitation, but with this objection removed, as Wicks has done, there can be no doubt as to which represents the greatest artistic value.

If a pipe organ is to be a work of art it must receive individual attention. Stock instruments which are alike for all purposes, fail to satisfy the discriminating buyer. Standard methods of tone production, voicing and pipe scales can not be employed. Every Wicks organ, be it large or small, is constructed individually for the building in which it is to be installed. Moreover, the tone regulating at the factory is done in a sound-proof room by an internationally famous voicer.

In general, therefore, the Wicks Company offers a great value - in fact a heretofore unheard of value. It is a product of the highest standards in voicing and action, fully guaranteed, yet comparatively inexpensive. What is true of the small organ applies to the large organs as well. Over fifteen hundred (1500) Wicks located in America and several foreign countries, are monuments to the art of organ building.

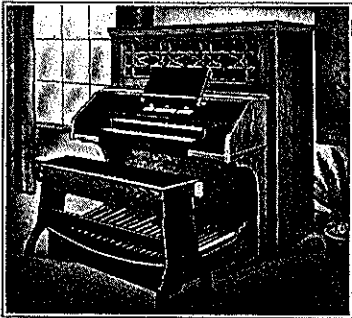

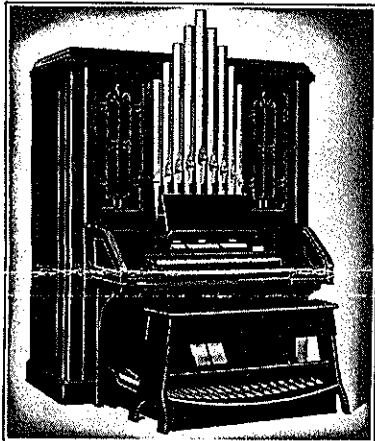

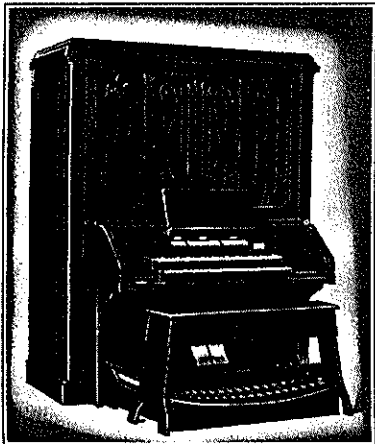

— 1/4 H.P.:19 1/2 inches deep 18 inches high 33 inches wide, wind conductor 6 inches in diameter.
- CONSOLE

— May be detached at extra cost of \$175.00. Size of detached console 4 feet 9 inches wide, 3 feet 8 inches deep, 3 feet 9 inches high.
- PLAYER

— A very fine reproducing player brings every phase of music to those who do not play. Our library of rolls is excellent. Price \$700 00
- CHIMES

— 4 notes \$60.00 13 notes \$150.00 20 notes \$200.00 Chimes can not be located inside of case No. 1. Provision must be made to place them elsewhere, which is simple because of our electric action. No extra space is needed for chimes in case No. 2 N or 3 N in all models except the Miniature. If added to this model depth increases 3 inches.
- PEDAL PIPES

— If twelve pedal pipes are desired instead of the special bass, add \$95.00 to the price. They CAN NOT be placed in case No. 1 and when added to other models the depth increases 12 inches.
- AUTOMATIC PEDAL ACCOMPANIMENT

- FINISH

— Walnut of a medium dark shade. Light, golden, medium and dark oak.
- NOTE

— The blower must be placed within 25 feet of the organ. If this is not possible, or if there is no place for the blower, we can build it within the organ at an extra cost of \$65.00 This can ONLY be done with cases 2 N or 3 N due to their height.



AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into by and between the WICKS PIPE ORGAN CO. of Highland, Madison County, Illinois, hereinafter called the party of the first part, and Addie M. Whitney

of Seneca Castle Ontario New York
City or Town County State

hereinafter called the party of the second part,

The party of the first part, for and in consideration of the sum

of ~~One thousand three hundred seventy-five~~ no/100 dollars \$ 137.50 Dollars,
agrees to furnish and install for the party of the second part, an organ in accordance with the attached plans and specifications and which are a part of this agreement, in building known as the Presbyterian Church
Name of Building

in Seneca Castle Ontario New York
City or Town County State

said organ to be ready for use on or before June 15, 1937
or as soon thereafter as possible.

The party of the second part also agrees to assume all risks of damage to said organ or parts thereof, after said organ has been deposited in said building.

The party of the second part agrees to give the party of the first part free and undisturbed access to the above building for a period of days before the organ is to be ready for use, with adequate light, heat and storage room necessary for the proper installation of the organ.

The party of the second part also agrees to furnish, at their own cost, a suitable foundation in the above building, on which the above organ is to be erected, and to make at their own expense any changes in the building which are necessary for the proper installation of the organ.

THE PARTY OF THE SECOND PART FURTHER AGREES TO INSTALL, UNDER THE SUPERVISION OF THE PARTY OF THE FIRST PART, THE GALVANIZED IRON PIPE (FURNACE PIPE) FROM THE BLOWER TO THE ORGAN PROPER: ALSO INSTALL ALL WIRING, SWITCHES, REMOTE CONTROLS, CONNECTING THE MOTOR AND THE LIGHTS IN THE ORGAN AND CONSOLE TO THE POWER SERVICE LINE, THE CONTROL LINE TO THE CONSOLE AND THE GENERATOR LINE TO THE ORGAN AND CONSOLE TERMINALS.

The party of the second part further agrees to carry both fire and tornado insurance in the name of the party of the first part, for a sum equal to the amount of indebtedness of the party of the second part to party of the first part, said insurance to be issued and placed in the possession of the party of the first part immediately after the acceptance of the organ by the parties of the second part. It is also agreed that the said organ is and shall remain the property of the party of the first part until paid for in full.

By indebtedness, in all cases, is meant any and all deferred payments, whether covered by notes or otherwise.

The party of the second part further agrees to inspect and examine said organ immediately when notified by the party of the first part, or their representative, that such inspection or examination is desired, and, if said organ has been properly installed in accordance with this agreement, and every part thereof, the party of the second part will immediately make payment in the manner prescribed herein, to the authorized representative of the party of the first part.

Said organ shall not become a part of the realty, and shall not be removed from the above address, unless the party of the second part first obtains consent of the party of the first part or its assigns.

The party of the second part agrees to pay to the order of the Wicks Pipe Organ Co. in the following prescribed manner:
Ten (10) per cent of the contract price or ~~One hundred thirty-seven~~ 50/100 dollars \$137.50 upon
the signing of this agreement, One thousand two hundred thirty-seven 50/100 dollars

immediately upon installation of organ in Church. (Wicks Fuga Model,
case no. 2N Walnut and 20 note chimes). Freight included in the above
price

All deferred payments to be covered by notes, bearing () interest

If the party of the second part fails to make any of said payments as specified above, at the option of party of the first part or its assigns, all remaining installments may be declared immediately due and payable, and in such event the party of the second part agrees to return said organ to said party of the first part, or its assigns, on demand, and said party of the first part, or its assigns, may without notice of demand and without legal process enter into premises and take possession of said organ and all payments made shall be retained as liquidated damages for the use of said organ, or party of the first part or its assigns may declare the entire sum remaining unpaid hereunder to be immediately due and payable and elect to sue for the amounts due, thereby vesting the absolute title in said organ in party of the first part.

It is further agreed by and between the parties hereto that this contract is contingent upon strikes, accidents, and other delays unavoidable or beyond the control of the party of the first part.
