The Instrument Casavant Freres Opus 3839

Unlike other musical instruments, each pipe organ is a unique creation. In the history of Casavant Frères no other organ has been built with an identical list of stops, with the same visual design or in the same physical and acoustical setting as this instrument. In recognition of an organ's individuality, builders give each instrument a numerical designation similar to that used by composers. Casavant Freres has installed over three thousand eight hundred instruments This one, Opus 3839, is the eighty-third Casavant installation in North Carolina since the first one arrived in Statesville in 1925. It is interesting that the oldest and most recent Casavant organs should be in neighboring cities.

The design of a pipe organ begins with listening, listening to the committee and resident church musician articulate their requirements and describe their aspirations for the new instrument. Imagining how it will sound based upon what will be played and how it will be used for worship and the other musical activities anticipated by the church becomes the basis for what stops are selected and how they fit into the ensemble of the organ.

The organ is located in two areas immediately behind the façade that incorporates speaking pipes from the organ's Principal pipes. The pipes of the Swell division are located behind the left façade while the Great is positioned in the similar location on the right. Altogether the organ is in an advantageous location speaking directly down the main axis of the church.

This instrument's specification is based upon historical practice that will allow the performance of a wide range of literature from all schools and periods. Tonally the instrument has been planned to address the needs of the church for congregational singing, choral and instrumental accompaniment and the performance of a wide range of organ literature for worship and the occasional concert.

The Great division contains the organ's primary principal chorus plus appropriate flutes and two reeds, a Trumpet and Cromorne. The chorus of the Swell division is based upon the Major Flute 8' and contains a variety of other sounds including the Salicional and Voix Céleste (organ strings), a Bassoon-Oboe plus flutes of various unison and non-unison pitches that are useful for creating colorful effects. The Swell also has a trumpet stop called a Cornopean 8', which has a contrasting timbre with the Great Trumpet.

Because St. John's Lutheran Church is a spacious building, we wanted the Pedal division to provide a solid fundamental tone. Therefore the longest and lowest pipes of the Contrabass 16' are made of large wood pipes, which are known for producing a commanding fundamental sound. In addition, a large scale stopped wood Subbass 16' complements the Contrabass 16' for use in smaller ensembles while the duplexed Bourdon 16' is useful for soft registrations.

The pipe scaling and voicing techniques have been selected to maximize the breadth and warmth of the organ's ensemble while maintaining clarity and transparency of the combinations needed for polyphonic music. Individual stops have been selected to provide variety of tone at various dynamic and pitch levels, and the approach to voicing has been to provide maximum color from individual stops.

Knowing that the realization of this instrument represents the combined aspirations and efforts of many people has made this an especially rewarding project. We take special pride in the results that have been achieved through careful collaboration with everyone associated with this project. It has been a privilege to be associated with members of St. John's Lutheran Church, and we trust that the voice of this instrument will lead, inspire and comfort those who hear it for generations.

Performing Artists

Florence Jowers is Assistant Professor of Music and College Organist at Lenoir-Rhyne College, teaching in the Sacred Music Program. Ms. Jowers received music degrees from Stetson University, DeLand, Florida, (B.M.) and Yale University School of Music, New Haven, Connecticut (M.M.). Organ study has been with Paul Jenkins, Leonard Raver, Charles Krigbaum, and Todd Wilson. She was also the recipient of a Rotary International Fellowship for post-graduate study abroad, at which time she studied with the late Anton Heiller at the Hochschule für Musik in Vienna, Austria, and with Peter Planyavsky at St. Stephen's Cathedral.

Ms. Jowers is past president of Region 2 of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians, and out-going Dean of the Hickory Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. She has served as clinician for AGO, ALCM, and PAM conferences, and has concertized extensively in the eastern United States, Germany, Austria, and the Czech Republic, including a recital at the 1995 Piccolo Spoleto Festival in Charleston, South Carolina, and several performances heard on National Public Radio's "Pipedreams". In addition to her organ work, she is the founder and conductor of the Lenoir-Rhyne Youth Chorus, an auditioned community performing ensemble consisting of three choirs for treble voices between the ages of eight and eighteen.

Ms. Jowers and her husband, Dr. Paul Weber, have developed the Sacred Music Program at Lenoir-Rhyne College into a nationally recognized course of study whose students have attained several honors and awards, have won competitions and are currently in such prestigious graduate programs as Yale University and the University of Nebraska, as well as at the Lutheran Southern Seminary in Columbia, South Carolina.

Paul Weber is Associate Professor of Church Music at Lenoir-Rhyne College and coordinator of the college's Sacred Music Program. In 1999 Dr. Weber was appointed Director of the Lenoir-Rhyne College A Cappella Choir, which has toured for sixty-eight years throughout the United States and has made seven European tours.

Dr. Weber's hymns, anthems and liturgical settings are sung across the church. He won the 1995 Chautauqua Chamber Singers Choral Composition Contest for his anthem, "Prayer for Christian Unity." In 1995 and again in 1997, Dr. Weber won the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians' national composition contests. In 2003 he was awarded the prestigious Raabe Prize for Excellence in Sacred Composition by the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians at its national conference in San Deigo, California. His liturgical settings and hymns have been field-tested by the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod for inclusion in its forthcoming worship resources. Dr. Weber's arrangement of "A Mighty Fortress" sung today was written for the 2001 Catawba County Lutheran Reformation Celebration and his choral setting of Psalm 99, "The Lord Reigns," was written and performed last fall for the 200th Anniversary Service of the North Carolina Synod (ELCA) at Wake Forest University Chapel.

Dr. Weber received a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Choral Conducting from The University of Iowa, a Master of Musical Arts degree in Composition from Yale University, and a Master of Music degree in Organ Performance from Washington University, St. Louis. He attended Concordia College, Bronxville, New York, and Concordia Senior College, Ft. Wayne, Indiana, before registering at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Missouri. He was ordained in 1979. His ministry has included two pastorates in Western Pennsylvania.
