ORGAN DEDICATION.—TO-MORROW,
(Sunday) AFTERNOON, April 22, at 3 o'clock,
the new and superior toned ORGANO of St. Matthew's
Lutheran Church, on Canal, near Baltimore st., from
the factory of Messrs. H. & G. Berger, will be dedicat-
ed for the use of Christian worship, when the Rev. Dr.
H. KURTZ will preach in the English language. A col-
lection will be taken up to aid this new congregation in
defraying expenses. The public are affectionately in-
vited to attend. There will also be preaching in the
morning in the German language. It is

Handsome Church Organs.—The authorities of
St. Matthew's German Lutheran Church, on Can-
nal, near Baltimore street, (Rev. Chas. G. Weyl,
pastor,) have just had manufactured for that
church a fine toned organ, by Mr. Henry F. Ber-
ger. The case is of solid walnut, in the old Ro-
man style of architecture, measuring 12 feet in
height, 6 feet deep, and 7½ feet wide, with eleven
stops, pedal, and one row of keys. The stops are
finely voiced, and the appearance of the instru-
ment is an ornament to the church. It was per-
formed on last Sunday morning for the first time
by Mr. Berger, and in the afternoon by Mr. Hin-
stan, organist of the Lutheran Chapel congrega-
tion, whose choir was also present.
