

Organ in Gates Mansion Is Purchased by Church

The Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Redeemer has purchased the Eolian organ, which has been virtually unused in the Gates mansion on Lake of the Isles boulevard for 15 years.

The organ will not be removed from the mansion until after the Junior league has vacated the home Tuesday, according to the Rev. J. Franklin Marlatt, pastor, who announced the purchase Friday.

The organ has 3,000 pipes, chimes and a harp arrangement. Its purchase from the Globe Wrecking Co. was authorized by a church committee composed of Carl A. Carlson, Dr. Raymond H. Lundquist, Allison G. Taylor and J. H. Leaf.

Members of the Junior league Friday were making final preparations to take over the mansion beginning Sunday for a three-day series of

sightseeing tours of the showplace. The tours will be open to the public.
