The great organ contains eleven stops, as follows.—Open diapason, stopped diapason bass, melodia treble, dulciana, principal, twelfth, fifteenth, flageolet, flute, sharp mixture, trumpet, clarionet. The small organ contains the following stops.—Bourdon bass, bourdon treble, open diapason, violin gamba, stopped diapason bass, stopped diapason treble, principal, twelfth, fifteenth, trumpet, oboe. The pedal organ contains the open diapason and dulciana. In all there are 1168 pipes.
