OUR DEDICATORY RECITALIST

Thomas Richner is widely recognized as a major American talent on three separate fronts — as a concert pianist, concert organist, and as the country's leading authority on the performance of Mozart's keyboard music. No other performer has gained his level of repute as both organist and pianist, and no other pianist has challenged his world-wide reputation as the foremost Mozart performer.

Dr. Richner has performed, both as organist and pianist, throughout Europe and Asia as well as North America. Even when not on tour, however, travel is part of his routine. He lives in New Jersey during the academic year while teaching at Douglass College of Rutgers University. Twice each week he commutes to Boston where he is organist of The First Church of Christ, Scientist ("The Mother Church").

Thomas Richner is also highly regarded as a clinic and workshop leader, and each summer directs the Colby Institute of Church Music in Maine which he co-founded. He is the author of a book of the interpretation of Mozart's piano literature which has undergone a number of printings in the United States and is now available in paperback in several other countries through a London publisher. Dr. Richner formerly taught at Teachers' College of Columbia University in New York, and he has performed numerous times over the years in New York's major concert halls.

David Broom, of Austin Organs, was the

tonal designer. Installation of the instrument was by Bernard Higgins and tonal finishing by Zoltan Zsitvay. Austin Organs, Inc. was founded in 1893 by members of the Austin family. Chairman of the board is Frederick B. Austin, and Donald B. Austin is president. The company is located in Hartford, Connecticut, and is one of the oldest continuing builders in North America.
