






The Aeolian-Skinner Opus 1024 was born in Boston, Massachusetts, during the summer of 1941, under the guiding hand of G. Donald Harrison. In 1942 it became the showpiece organ at the University of Texas and the landmark instrument for the Aeolian-Skinner company. But, after nearly forty years of service, the University virtually

mothballed the organ and left it silent until Dr. Robert Rapp learned that St. Andrew's had lost its organ in the terrible fire of February 11, 1996, and he went to work to find a new home for the magnificent, but neglected, organ languishing in Austin. After prayerful consideration the Clergy, the Vestry, and the parishioners of St. Andrew's decided to buy and restore the Aeolian-Skinner Opus 1024. And so we have!



It took over two years for Schoenstein and Company to restore it, but in September of 2004, the organ and 6,246 pipes came home to St. Andrew's. Parishioners heard about 25 percent of the organ for the first time on St. Andrew's Day in 2004. On March 31, 2005, the Choir from Christ's Church, Oxford, England, performed the inaugural concert with the organ. Tonight St. Andrew's Episcopal Church dedicates the Aeolian-Skinner Opus 1024.





Guild of Organists national competition. In 1986 the A.G.O. named him International Artist of the Year. His career is increasingly international in scope. He has appeared in Japan, England, Finland, Argentina, and Australia. A talented choir conductor, Professor Murray trained one of the most respected American choirs of men and boys at St. Paul's Episcopal Cathedral in Boston before he came to Yale. And at Yale he directed the University Choir for five years.






Since his arrival in 1988, Maestro Setapen has continually moved the Amarillo Symphony into the top ranks of American orchestras. He has conducted many orchestras throughout the United States as well as orchestras in Germany and Italy. In June 2002, he and his daughter Ilana were guest conductor and violin soloist with the Musical Offerings of Venice Chamber Orchestra. In March, 2002, he was one of eight conductors worldwide chosen to work in Krakow, Poland, with Maestro Christoph Eschenback, the renowned conductor of the Philadelphia Orchestra. In the summer of 1999, he was on the faculty of the Conductor's Institute at Bard College in New York, where he taught twenty-five



conductors. During Maestro Setapen's tenure, the Amarillo Symphony has attracted internationally acclaimed guests artists, commissioned two major symphonic works, produced CDs, expanded its outreach into the community, performed a broad spectrum of the repertoire, and been the subject of two nationally televised documentaries.


