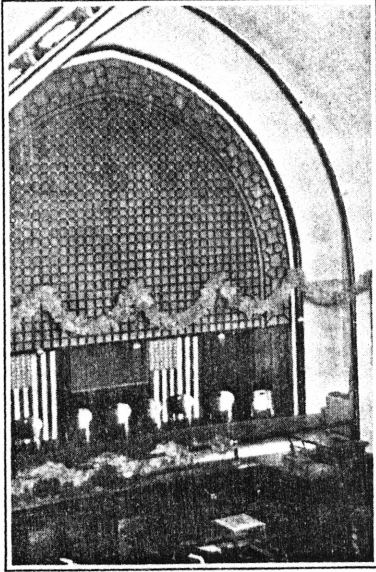


THE PIPE ORGAN

The Memorial Pipe Organ, a product of the Kimball Organ Co. of Chicago, is an instrument of great depth of power and beauty and richness of tone. It was dedicated Sunday, January 18, 1920, at



the 11 o'clock service. An announcement of the event is found in the Enterprise of Jan. 16, 1920.

"Presbyterian Church has installed fine instrument. Splendid memorial for Soldier Boys. To be dedicated Sunday Jan. 18 at 11 a. m. with appropri-

ate services. The American Legion and all soldiers living here and all G. A. R. men invited to attend in a body in uniform.

"The Organ is to be dedicated as an instrument of worship and also as a memorial to the loyalty, bravery and sacrifice of our soldiers who served in the great war.

Issue of Jan. 23, 1920 carries full account of the dedication.

"Presbyterian Church filled for the event. An event that will long be remembered in the annals of the Presbyterian Church of this city was the dedicatory exercises which marked the installation of one of the finest Church organs in this part of the West, etc.

"A special program was given with C. S. Walton presiding at the organ. Dr. Weaver paid a splendid tribute to the former service men of the church and community."

"The committee who have had charge of selecting and installing the new instrument are to be congratulated on their good work and the great success that has met their efforts."

A musical concert announced for Monday evening, Jan. 26, 1920 at which time Prof. Henry Housley of Denver, one of the best organists in the West, assisted by Rose McGrew, well-known soprano of Denver, will give a concert. Musical program indicated.

Just recently, on Tuesday Dec. 21, 1937, Mrs. Mae Silsby White, organist, was heard in a recital on the Memorial Pipe Organ with Mrs. K. J. Sinding, soloist, in two groups of songs accompanied on the piano by Miss Ann Heckman.

The Organ bears a bronze plaque with inscription and the names of the men of the Presbyterian Church who served in the World War as follows:
