
The new organ is now complete and choir rehearsal was held in St. Peter's church last night for the first time.

TO BE DEDICATED.
St. Peter's Catholic Church Organ to be Used the First Time To-morrow.
Didinger & Co., of Philadelphia, have just completed at St. Peter's Catholic church a tubular-pneumatic organ. This organ is of the latest design and is their own invention. The organ is divided in eighteen stops, eight stops in great, eight in small and two in pedal. The system is simple, yet perfect. This is the first organ of this kind placed west of Pittsburg. It has been tested by expert organists, and is pronounced the sweetest toned organ in the city. John Mohr, jr., will manipulate the keys at high-mass to-morrow morning, and no doubt the capacity of the church will be tested.
