Philip E. Baker, a native Texan, graduated from high school in Burkburnett, Texas. He attended Midwestern University in Wichita Falls, Texas, where he majored in organ under Dr. Nita Akin and received the Bachelor of Arts degree in 1957. While at Midwestern he served as Associate Organist, First Methodist Church, Wichita Falls, and assisted in the extensive music ministry of that church. After two years in the Army, in 1959 Mr. Baker became Organist and Associate Director of Music at this church, under Dr. F. L. Whittlesey. While serving in this capacity, Mr. Baker completed the Master of Arts degree at SMU, and did further graduate work at the Union Theological Seminary in New York City. He studied organ with Dr. David Lumsden of New College, Oxford, England; harpsichord with Dr. Leonard Raver; choral conducting with Dr. Lloyd Pfautsch and Dr. Robert Fountain; and served on the Organ Faculty of SMU. In 1965, he accepted his present position, Director of the Ministry of Music, Highland Park United Methodist Church. In demand as a clinician and recitalist, Mr. Baker has been presented in workshops and recitals throughout the nation. Among his several extra responsibilities he is the Director of the National Open Competition in Organ Playing for the American Guild of Organists, and the Music Representative of the South - Central Jurisdiction of the United Methodist Church. In 1960 he married the former Tissa Roberts, who has served as Associate Director of Music at University Park Methodist Church, Dallas. She is presently assisting in the complex Music Ministry of this church with her husband. They have four children.

John F. Erickson is a native of Illinois and received his musical education at the American Conservatory of Music, Chicago and Northwestern University, where he studied organ with Robert Lodine, Thomas Matthews, and Richard Enright. Coming to this church in 1968 from First Congregational Church, La Grange, Illinois where he had been Director of Music, his work here has been primarily in the areas of music for younger children and music for contemporary worship, in the church's Music Ministry. Mr. Erickson has served as lecturer at church music workshops, and his articles on music for younger children have appeared in the Methodist church music journal, *Music Ministry*. He is the composer of several published anthems.

THE RITUAL OF DEDICATION

We present this Organ for dedication, the gift of Mrs. Ruby Prince for the glory of God and in loving memory of Virginia C. Jennings and Willie E. Mitchell. In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, we dedicate this Organ to the praise of Almighty God.

We dedicate this Organ to the healing of life's discords, and the revealing of the hidden soul of harmony; to the lifting of the depressed and the comforting of the sorrowing: to the humbling of the heart before the eternal mysteries and the lifting of the soul to abiding beauty and job by the gospel of infinite love and good will.

That at the Name of Jesus every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth; and that very tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Let us pray. Our God and Father, whom the generations have worshiped with concord of sweet sound, be pleased to accept this Organ as a song of praise unto Thee. Amen.

Grant that its music, with accomanying song, may come as a blessed benediction upon all who worship here. Amen.

May this Organ become undying music in the world as its notes of cheer, comfort, communion, and courage are modulated into human lives for daily task and noble service. Amen.

To all organists who shall sound its notes, and to all worshipers who shall be lifted Godward by its voice, may there come at times the sweep of hallelujahs from the throne of the Redeemer until earth below shall be attuned to heaven above, singing hallelujah to Him who reigneth, Lord of lords, the King of kings.
