Jerald Hamilton's early study was with Frank Van Dusen at the American Conservatory in Chicago. He received his Bachelor and Master of Music degrees from the University of Kansas, where he was a pupil of Laurel Everette Anderson, and later did further advanced study with Catharine Crozier and Gustav Leonhardt. In 1954-55, he went to Paris to study with André Marchal on a Fulbright Scholarship and while abroad also attended the Royal School of Church Music in Croydon, England. More recently, Hamilton attended the School of Sacred Music at the Union Theological Seminary in New York.

Before going to Austin in 1960, as a distinguished artist-teacher, Jerald Hamilton had taught at Washburn University in Topeka, Kansas, and at Ohio University. In Topeka he also was organist and choirmaster at Grace Cathedral, and presently he is organist and choirmaster at St. David's Episcopal Church in Austin, Texas, in addition to his position of Assistant Professor of Organ and Church Music at the University of Texas.
