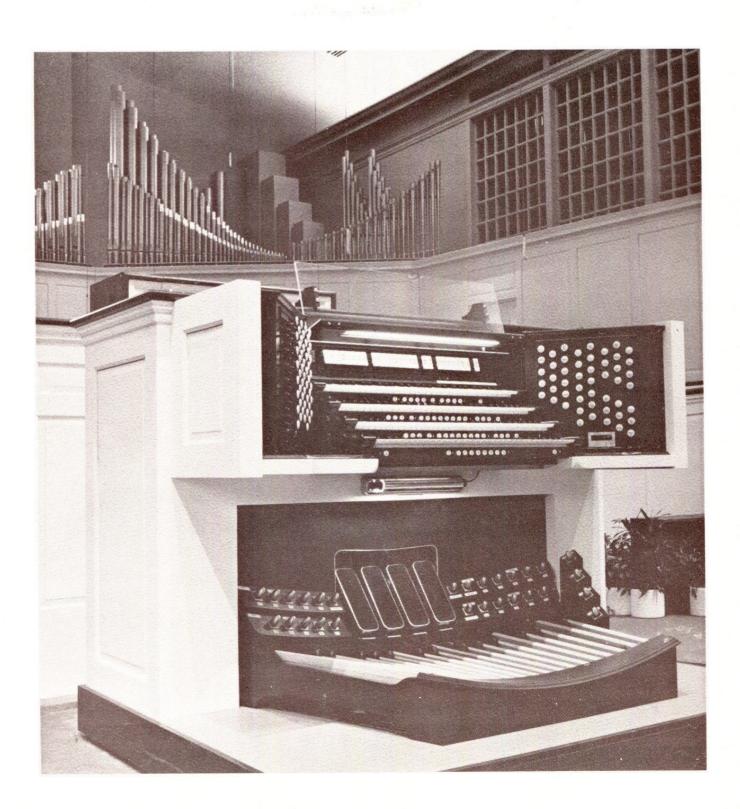
The Organist

John Weaver

John Weaver is Director of Music at New York's Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church and head of the Organ Department at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia. As a prominent concert artist for over 20 years, he has played numerous recitals throughout the United States, Canada and Germany. He has frequently been invited to play for local, regional and national gatherings of the American Guild of Organists and has made several recordings, radio and television appearances and concerto dates. His published compositions for chorus, organ and flute/organ have been widely performed.

John Weaver's musical training began at the age of six at the Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore. He graduated from the Curtis Institute of Music under Alexander McCurdy and earned the Master of Sacred Music degree from Union Theological Seminary in New York where he studied with Robert Baker.

His professional appointments include 11 years at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in New York, where he founded the famous Bach Cantata series, "Evenings with Johann S." In 1970 he was appointed to his present positions at Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church and the Curtis Institute. Previously he had served on the organ faculties of Union Theological Seminary and Westminster Choir College.

The Organ

M.P. Möller, Inc.

The new pipe organ for the Village United Presbyterian Church was built by the M.P. Möller Organ Company of Hagerstown, Md. Approximately 287 craftsmen, each an artist in his own field, were involved in the building of this instrument.

The organ is playable from a four manual console controlling six divisions. The pipes of the Great, Positiv and Pedal Organ are handsomely displayed in the central area directly behind the choir. The Swell organ speaks through the grills on the left side of the chancel, as does the Choir and Bombarde division in the right side.

The tonal design was developed by Richard M. Gayhart, M.P. Möller sales representative, in consultation with LaVergne Friday, principal organist of Village Church. The final finishing of the organ was under the direction of Donald M. Gillett, tonal director for the Möller Company. Installation was completed by Keith and Kenneth Gottschall of the Mid-States Pipe Organ Company, service representatives for M.P. Möller.

The Dedicatory Recital

Fantasia for Organ (1977)

John Weaver

(b. 1937)

Fantasia is a one-movement work in four connected sections: Allegro, Scherzo, Adagio and Finale. First performed at the New England Regional Convention of the American Guild of Organists, it is an attempt to use the colors of the organ in unusual ways while adding to the repertoire a cheerful and outgoing concert piece.

Passacaglia and Fugue in C Minor (S. 582)

J.S. Bach

(1685 - 1750)

The passacaglia is an old Spanish dance form characterized by a series of contrapuntal variations above a continuously repeated theme in the bass. In this work Bach converted the form into a dramatic composition of epical proportions. Announced in the bass, the theme eventually moves to the soprano and then the alto before returning to the bottom voice. There are 21 variations of amazing contrapuntal variety concluding with a double fugue based on part of the passacaglia theme.

Roulade

Seth Bingham

(1882 - 1972)

Seth Bingham had a distinguished career as composer, teacher (Yale School of Music, Columbia University and Union Theological Seminary) and church musician, serving at New York's Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church for over 35 years. This witty and urbane scherzo is his most popular work for the organ. April 16, 1982, is the 100th anniversary of his birth.

Dieu Parmi Nous (from La Nativité au Seigneur)

Olivier Messiaen

(b. 1908)

Messiaen is almost certainly the most important composer for the organ in this century. This work, written in 1936, is the last of nine meditations on the birth of our Lord. It is based on the verse from the prologue of John's Gospel, "The Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us." The brittle opening chords on full organ, the descending pedal figure and the tender legato passage of the first seven measures introduce the musical material from which all the rest is derived. The work closes with a brilliant toccata.

Fantasia and Fugue on "Ad Nos, Ad Salutarem Undam"

Franz Liszt (1811 - 1886)

Franz Liszt's name is so closely associated with the piano that it comes as a surprise to many to learn that he wrote some of the most important organ music of the 19th century. This outstanding composition uses as its subject a chorale from Meyerbeer's opera "Le Prophète." It is given out in the solemn introduction and is the basis of the tender adagio and allegro sections of the fantasia. The center section of the work is in variation form and offers many possibilities for the use of the quiet orchestral colors of the organ. The famous fugue based on the same subject is preceded by a fiery introduction in which a series of diminished chords is alternated with rapid cadenzas for the pedal.
