The New Congregational Organ.

Valued by the Manufacturers at \$7,000—
Something About It.

The new Congregational organ which is now in process of erection at the church, is to be, without doubt, a splendid instrument. It is by far the finest organ in the city and is the best ever sent out by the manufacturers, "The Marshall Lancashire Organ Co., of Moline, Ill."

The instrument is 22 feet wide, 10 feet deep, and 30 feet in height. In construction it consists of four distinct octagonal towers, made of pipes. The interstices consists also of pipes. Below are panels and other ornamentations. The wood work is oak of the highest finish, and is massive and modest rather than exceedingly ornamental, but of the best quality and workmanship which can be produced.

The organ is a three-manual, heavy pedal instrument, supplied with tubular, pneumatic action in the manuals and pedals, whereby the touch is very delicate and the repetition prompt. The pipes are 2,132 in number, of which fifty compose the first tier, all with terra cotta ground work and gilt ornamentation. The prevailing color of the organ harmonizes well with the church frescoling.

The manufacturers value it at about \$7,000. They made it upon special designs and have spent three months in its construction. N. S. Bach, who is superintending its erection here, states that it will be about three weeks before it can be made ready for use.
