THE MOLLER ORGAN — OPUS 9982

The new pipe organ at Brainerd Methodist Church was designed by William E. Gray, Jr., organist-choirmaster, and built by the M. P. Moller Organ Company of Hagerstown, Maryland, the largest builders of pipe organs in the world. The organ was designed for the musical requirements of Brainerd Methodist Church, taking into consideration that its primary purposes will be to enhance the worship of God—through serving as an adequate instrument to support congregational singing, to accompany our choirs in singing the great choral literature of the church, and in providing resources for magnificent service organ music. The organ, though designed primarily for worship, makes a very effective and resourceful recital instrument.

The organ has four manuals (keyboards) and pedalboard which control six divisions of pipes called the Major Great, Minor Great, Swell, Choir, Bombarde, and Pedal organs. There are 68 ranks of pipes representing 4,000 pipes, and a set of chimes with 25 bells.

Great efforts have been made to achieve the maximum beauty from this great instrument. Acoustical changes were made in the chancel and nave to allow the organ to produce its best sounds. In the chancel the dossal curtain was removed from behind the altar and one of our church families gave a beautiful stained glass window to go in its place. The openings to the organ chamber were increased to maximum dimensions so as not to trap the organ sound. The Major and Minor Great Organs are exposed and extend into the chancel. In the nave the drapes in the windows were replaced with louvered shutters which are more in keeping with the colonial architecture of the church, and the sound-absorbent ceiling was removed and replaced with hard, slick plaster.

All of these accoustical changes were made so as to allow the organ pipes to speak freely without having to be forced and becoming harsh. It also allows the full tone color of each set of pipes to be heard.

These changes were made on the recommendations of the Moller engineering department, but the results are more far reaching than just improving the organ sound. They have made the room more suitable for congregational singing, an easier room for the choirs to sing in, and speech is also more audible. This improves the atmosphere of the room for corporate worship and makes it possible for greater congregational participation.

The organ is the finest in our area, and one of the outstanding instruments of the southeast. The tonal conception could be classified as an American classic offering the best of the "Baroque Organ" sound and the best of the "Romantic Organ" sound, and capable of playing the best literature of any era and nationality. The sounds will be new to our ears, but they are scunds you will learn to love and will miss in many other organs you may hear when you visit in other churches.

We take great pleasure in expressing our appreciation to the Moller Organ Company for their cooperation and interest in our new organ. Our appreciation goes to Mr. W. R. Daniels, president; Mr. Monroe Ridgely, vice president; and Mr. John Hose, tonal director, who have given many hours of supervision to the building of this instrument. Our appreciation goes to Mr. Ray Bradberry, local representative of the Moller Company, who has supervised the installation of this instrument, and to his helpers, Bruce Heck and Roy James, from the Moller factory. Appreciation also goes to John Schleigh, head finisher of the organ company, for his excellent work in finishing this instrument and adding the final refinements to its beautiful tone. These dedicated organ builders with capable staffs composed of hundreds of men and women are to be congratulated on this excellent work of art.

We are most grateful to one of our devoted families for providing half the cost of this new pipe organ. May it always be used to the Glory of God.
