Description:

The organ is located in the choir loft at the rear of the church. It is housed in a dome nestled underneath the bell tower and in front of the large rose window. The console is separate from the organ, leaving a space for a choir between the façade and the console. None of the pipes on the façade are speaking. There are two swell boxes in the organ chamber. The box on the right houses the swell division while the box on the left houses the great. The pedal bourdon/flute and major bass can be found along the back wall underneath the rose window. The organ's motor is in a closet next to the organ in the choir loft. This organ is in very good condition. Very little has been altered on this organ throughout its 70 year lifespan. Our Lady of Ostrabrama church was built in 1919 to attend to the needs of Polish Catholics. The church is adorned with hand painted ceilings and hand crafted stained glass windows. The church is nestled between a vineyard and a nursery, which makes this building the most intimate of worship spaces on the North Fork of Long Island. Our Lady of Ostrabrama is the only Catholic Church within a 30 mile radius that has a pipe organ.
