The Reuter organ of Trinity Cathedral in Sacramento was dedicated by the Right Reverend John L. Thompson in December of 1983. The consultant for the organ project was Mr. Edward M. Stout, and Ms. Jeanne Burnelle was the Cathedral organist.

The spectacular Imperial Trumpet was given in 1990 in memory of The Very Reverend Charles Howard Perry, who was Dean of the Cathedral at the time the organ was installed. The trumpet was built by the Reuter Organ Company.

The two octave Peterson Chimes were given in 1993 in memory of Mildred Belle Carey. The Zymbelstern was given by Jane Coghill Elliott and Mary Coghill Stotts in memory of Caroline Hale Arnold Coghill.

The organ was given a thorough restoration in 2015, including cleaning, regulation, replacement of primary static reservoir and expression shade engines, and upgrades to the console. The work was completed by Philip L. Browning, who also maintains the instrument.

The antiphonal "Processional" division was completed by Schoenstein and Co. Organ Builders of Benicia, California in 2016, and dedicated to the honor of the late Reverend Dr Grant S. Carey, Canon Precentor Emeritus.
